CAMERA CLUB CONTEST WINNERS POSTED

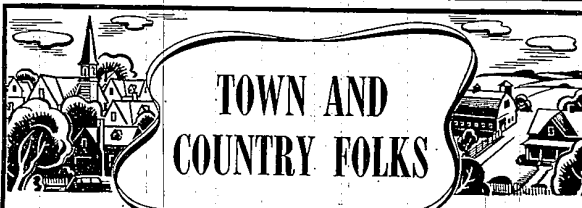
The February Camera Club contest winners have been posted in Mr. Tooker's room. First place goes to Richard Gohl with five points; and second to Floyd Garchow with four points.
