CIVIC THEATRE OPENS SPRING PARADE OF HITS

The Civic Theatre's spring parade of movie hits starts this week with a full program of sirens, spotlights, and leading off on Friday and Saturday is a double feature program including the Marx Bros' latest laugh epic "Go West." The year is 1870 and S. Quentin Quale (Groucho Marx), a young man, is heading the Horace Greeley advice. On his way west he meets Joe Pancelo (Chico Marx) and "Rusty" (Harpo Marx). The story deals with their exploits on arrival and how they become involved with Mrs. Harold See (Diana Lewis) and Terry Turner (John Carroll) in a deal to sell land to a railroad planning to extend its line to the

Pacific. The other feature is "The Texas Rangers Ride Again" and featured prominently in the cast are John Howard, Ellen Drew and May Robson.
On Sunday and Monday, the huge fantasy "Tales of Bagdad" will be shown at the Civic. The picture, based on the tales of the "Arabian Nights," has a cast including Sabu, Conrad Veidt and June Duprez, and thousands of others, and portrays such spectacles as the Flying Horse, the Magic Carpet, the All-Seeing Eye, a huge Genie and many other feats of magic. The companion piece is "Come Live With Me" which stars Holy Lamarr and James Stewart. It is a story of an Australian refugee (Holy Lamarr) and how she marries a writer (James Stewart) to escape deportation.
On Wednesday and Thursday nights, merchants' family nights, the program includes "Lucky Devils" with Richard Arlen and Andy Devine, and "Lil' Abner" with Granville Owen. "Lucky Devils" is a story of unweaned cameramen while the "Lil' Abner" film is based on the famed comic strip of the same name.


