BEEF CATTLE MEN PLAN FIVE TOURS OF STATE FARMS

Five events in rapid succession dot the calendar for Michigan farmers interested in beef cattle breeding and beef cattle feeding.
Tours in Kalamazoo, Calhoun and Isabella counties are scheduled respectively on May 22, May 29 and June 6. The annual Cattle Feeders' Day at Michigan State College will be Thursday, June 5. The annual Gladwin Beef Cattle sale is set for Thursday, June 12.
Cattle in the various stages of the fattening period will be seen on the tours, according to E. L. Bentley, college extension specialist in livestock. Use of common farm feeds predominate in rations. Feed costs, mineral mixtures and protein supplements, cattle grades, market outlook and questions are scheduled subjects at various stops on the tours.
The Kalamazoo county tour includes the farms of Clinton Buell, three-fourths mile west of Oshtemo, starting at 9 a. m., and the farms of Austin Reed, Jeva Farms, and Ed McManis, Reichland; Ed John Richard, Jarvis, Kalamazoo; James Blake, Galesburg; Harold Dyer, Ralph Bateman and Merle Vosburg, Climax; Bradley Thompson, Paul Carlson and John Kline, Stouts; Claud Southworth, D. C. Richardson, Stuart Smith and Glenn Lowe, Vicksburg.
Calhoun county stops begin on the farm of L. H. Vaughn, two miles south and four miles west of Albion and continue to Farley Brothers, Albion; George Ackley and Hector Mestdagh, Homer; George Schaefer, Tekonsha; C. G. Mahrie and Mills and Mahrie, Marshall; Brooks and Casey near Athens, and Arthur Case, Athens.
Four sponsors are inviting visitors to attend the events.

Crop Rotation Boosts Michigan Farm Profits

CHICAGO.—Crop rotation will pay Michigan farmers bigger dividends in increased crop profits and higher soil fertility if it is based on systematic planning and "follow-through," according to a statement issued here by the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee.
"Whether a rotation follows a three, four or six year cycle," says the statement, "it should have a definite starting point and a definite completion. By this means farmers will be able to take intelligent stock of the results and obtain profitable guidance for the future.
Corn Important.
"In most rotation programs starting this spring, corn will be the basic crop because of the remarkable production records of hybrid fertilizer if it is based on systematic planning and "follow-through," according to a statement issued here by the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee.
"Every well planned rotation will include a soil improving legume at regular intervals to replenish the nitrogen removed by other crops. The farmer should make certain that he not only gets a good stand of clover or alfalfa, but he should make sure to produce a good yield of high quality.
"Here, again, the matter of nourishment from the soil is important in fulfilling their task of providing nitrogen, legumes remove a large quantity of phosphorus and potash from the land. The application of fertilizer is thus a necessary and profitable step.
Cooperation Available.
"The quantity and analysis of fertilizer to use will depend on the type of soil, the uses to which it has been put in previous years and the crop to be grown. County agents or agronomists at the state colleges or experiment stations will gladly give the farmer advice on the selection of plant foods best suited for his purposes.
"In a number of states a list of "Recommended Grades" is made available by the agricultural college. Based by agronomists under practical growing conditions, these recommended grades are adequate to cover most soil and crop conditions."
