COMMITTEE HAS 155 GARMENTS FOR WAR VICTIMS

Mrs. Mary Beckett, chairman of Christian Science War Relief Committee of the Christian Science Society of Farmington, reports that 155 garments and other articles have been prepared by the local committee for shipment to the war sufferers in countries at war. The committee meets every Thursday from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. in the home of the chairman, at 20548 Delaware avenue, near S-Mile Road. The committee is glad to welcome visitors to their meetings and is happy to have the help of those who are not members of the Christian Science church. Workers are permitted to take articles home to finish them, and materials are supplied by the committee. Special collections are taken by the church from time to time and generous contributions by individuals have been received with which to carry on the work.

The Farmington committee is working through the Detroit headquarters maintained at 817 Book Building, which is open daily from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m., where those desiring to aid in the work may secure instructions and materials, or may call Cherry 9570.

Since last October more than 1400 cases of goods for war relief have been sent abroad by the Christian Science War Relief Committee of the Mother Church, the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts. All materials are distributed to those in need without reference to creed, color, race or nationality by local committees appointed by branches of The Mother Church. Shipments are made from Boston, New York, Los Angeles, and Portland. Shipping space has allowed to remain unoccupied for any length of time. It is gratifying to know that nearly all shipments are arriving safely. Of 25 shipments sent up to April 1st, 22 had been received abroad and another is believed to have

been delivered since that time. Since April 1st another shipment of 996 cases has been shipped.

Letters Received
Hundreds of letters expressing gratitude have been received, a typical one reading, "Yesterday I took two little homeless children to my Christian Science War Relief room and they were fitted out with little woolen suits, even caps to match. While I was there yesterday at least eight frightened looking people came in for clothing, some of them shivering with cold. But they went away smiling and warm."

Local Christian Science churches and societies of the United States and Canada have formed committees for making and preparing goods for shipment and individuals in isolated places are forwarding articles direct to the headquarters in Boston.

Generous contributions have been received by local committees from individuals and from large firms. Rooms with light, heat and janitor service have been freely given in many communities. Dry cleaning firms have offered to clean all clothing free of charge. A box of concern shipped 65 dozen pairs of stockings to the Committee in Boston. An Oregon minister brought the entire collection of goods from his church to the headquarters of a Christian Science group which was equipped to handle it. Sewing machine agencies have generously donated machines for use in the workroom and experienced garment cutters have given many hours to cutting out clothing for the sewers to work on.

CHIMNEY ROCKS AFFORD GOOD GEOLOGY STUDY

There is material for a careful study by an experienced geologist in the history of numerous chimney rocks or pinnacles of broken dolomite near St. Ignace and on Mackinac Island, the best known of which is the 150-foot high Castle Rock climbed annually by thousands of tourists.

The pinnacles were examined on a recent geological excursion of the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts and Letters, and it was pointed out at that time that no complete study of the manner of their formation has ever been made.

One theory of geologists about their formation is that the area surrounding them was on of a series of high cliffs of dolomite, the promontories or headlands of which were undercut by wave action, causing broken fragments to pile up at the base where they were cemented together. Millions of years of erosion then wore down the cliffs while the breccias—the broken and cemented rock which for some reason was harder and more resistant—remained in the form of chimneys or rock pinnacles.

The pinnacles, which are located north and west of St. Ignace and on Mackinac Island, are not found elsewhere in Michigan. O. F. Pondexter of the conservation department's geology division, who planned the Academy tour in this region, said today.

Trout Suffer From Bolt of Lightning

A violent electrical storm which burned out a transformer near Thompson, state fish hatchery left some adult trout floating on the surface of the exhibit pond and many others in the pond swimming erratically. Stanley Shust, fisheries district supervisor, reports.

Though unmarked in any way, the fish gutted and moved spasmodically, and appeared to have difficulty maintaining their equilibrium. All but 10—nine broods and a carabao—recovered from the meteorological blitzkrieg. A conduit leading from the main hatchery building to a garage across the pond closely and is believed to have carried the charge from a bolt of lightning to the fish.
