ORDINANCE NO. C-18
An ordinance to amend the Zoning Map part of Ordinance No. C18, known as the Zoning Ordinance, with respect to: (1) the removal of certain district boundary lines; (2) the establishment of certain new district boundary lines; (3) the change in classification of Block No. 3 of Davis Addition from that of a Residence B District to that of a Commercial A District.

In pursuance of authority granted by Act 207 of the Public Acts of Michigan for 1921 as amended, and in accordance with the provisions of Ordinance No. C-18, known as the Zoning Ordinance, the City of Farmington Ordains:

Section 1. The motion with respect to the change in classification of Lot No. 18 and Lot No. 19 of Block Three of Davis Addition from that of a Residence B District to that of a Commercial A District which was adopted by the City Commission of the City of Farmington at a special meeting called at 8:30 P. M. on the 27th of February 1941 is hereby rescinded.

Section 2. The following described district boundary line shall be considered as obliterated and no longer a part of the Zoning Map: Beginning at the center of the intersection of Thomas Street and Warren Street and running in the center of Warner in a southerly westerly direction to the center of the intersection of Warner Street and Grand River Avenue, thence along the center of Grand River Avenue in a south-easterly direction to the point which meets that district boundary line which coincides with approximately one-half the lot line dividing Lot No. 14 and Lot No. 15 of Assessor's Plat No. 2, and that Block Three of Davis Addition shall hereafter be considered classified as a Commercial A District.

Section 3. The following described new district boundary line shall be considered a part of the Zoning Map: Beginning on the center line of Grand River Avenue at the end of that district boundary line which coincides with approximately one-half of the lot line dividing Lot No. 14 and Lot No. 15 of Assessor's Plat No. 2, and proceeding along Grand River Avenue in a south-easterly direction to the center of the intersection of Grand River Avenue and School Street, thence in a north-easterly direction along the center line of School Street to the end of School Street.

This Ordinance shall be in effect twenty (20) days from the date of its passage.

Made and passed by the City Commission of the City of Farmington, this 11th day of June, A. D. 1941.

Heaviest kill in the state was in Roscommon county, where 2,777 deer were taken, according to estimates. Other counties in lower Michigan in which more than 2,000 deer were killed are Oscoda, Alcona, Ogemaw, Crawford and Lake, with the Montmorency county kill only slightly less. Chippewa county was the only one north of the straits in which more than 2,000 bucks were taken.

Roscommon county's 12,516 hunters, a concentration of 22.37 hunters per square mile, killed 5.23 deer per square mile to lead all counties in the state in hunting pressure. Above the straits Chippewa county had the most hunters, 4,859; and the highest deer kill, 2,036; while Luce county had the most hunters per square mile, 4.77; and the highest deer kill per square mile, 1.96.

SANDY SOIL REBUILT QUICKLY

Soil of sandy type may be rebuilt swiftly in fertility, but it can be rebuilt quickly, too, reports Dominik Stoffek, Berrien county fruit and truck crop grower. Under guidance of the soil conservation district in the county, he now is cropping but half of his land, yet getting twice as great total production of melons and other truck crops. Rye is planted in fall. This is plowed down in spring and half the land is planted to truck, and the other half seeded with soybeans and sudan grass. The late land is plowed again in fall and reseeded to rye, thus giving three great manure crops for every harvested crop in the two-year rotation.

Early Spawning Promises Good Catches

Bass and bluegills have spawned early and are expected to be off the nests by the opening of the lake fishing season June 25, according to preliminary reports to the conservation department's fish division.

Excellent spring and early summer weather is believed to assure production of a good crop of bass and bluegill fry also. Department of conservation bass and bluegill rearing ponds were stocked with breeder fish early, and sow are in full operation.

To prevent presentation of illegally taken nests, Minnesota officials, ordered, just before the state's beaver trapping season began, that the pelts brought in for sealing should have the tail attached intact. Usually the tails are not taken with the skins.
