IN REVERSE-GAS GOES DOWN Usual methods of handling nat-ural gas are operating in reverse in Austin township, Mecosta coun-ty, where gas is now being pumped down into the ground instead of

being taken from it. To prevent premature abandon-ment of gas wells in Austin township, surplus gas produced in sum-mer from wells in Lincoln towa-ship, Clare county, is being piped to Lansing and stored underground

ship. Clare county, is being piped to Lansing and stored underground for use during high peak loads in winter months. Twenty million cc ble feet of gas was put down in the first month of operations. Lack of pressure makes it difficult to supply Muskegon and Big Rap-ids with enough gas from Austin Holds in winter when the demand is at peak, making necessary the storing of gas in the wells during the off-peak consumption periods. Plans have been made to pipe gas later (rom other parts of Mich-igan and from Texas to this pool for storage during summer months. Texas gas could be brought here by extending pipelines from Dh-rott, whilen now receives gas from the Panhandle state. The ad-ditional supply of gas would rp-lieve pressure of the winter peak demand and allow gas to be sup-ned by Michigan wells to other citles in the state not now receiv-ing it. Just suit me. Residents of the region around Lovells reported the eerfe. sounds. Old timers explained there was seepage from Shupac lake to the lower level of the North Branch of the Au Sable river, and that when the wind was of a cer-tain velocity and the water was at a certain level, suction in an underground, channel made the resonant sounds. Word of the mystery reached Conservation Officer Lew Dorman, of Grayling, who took the oppor-tunity ioffered by a creek-checking patrol along the North Branch one evening to investigate. With one of the mystified hoal residents to lidentify the sound, he went cau-

identify the sound, he went cau-tiously to the shore of the lake. Officer Dorman recognized the sound at its first occurrence but

to convince his companion he rowed their boat quietly through rowed their boat quietly through the reeds toward the yumping noise. When within a few-yards of it, they stood up, saw a long-legged marsh bird, the bittern, bobbing lis head up and down as it extend-ed its neck in convulsive jerks to make the noise that gives it the name of "thunder-pumper" and started strainge theories about Shu-pac lake drainage.
