BEAN PLANTS NEED PROPER KIND OF DUST

Bean plants just can't take it, warns C. B. Dibble, extension specialist in insect control, Michigan State College. Therefore he suggests bean growers should not use calcium arsenate or arsenate of lead to fight Mexican bean beetles on beans. When the lace-curtain effect appears on the beans, the best treatment is a dust of pyrethrum or rotenone. This controls the old beetles on the under side of the leaves.
