Science Cuts Soil Improvement Cost



Bumper Crop Crops Are Reward for Good Soil Management.

CHICAGO. — Teamwork between science and industry was cited as the reason why farmers pay less for fertilizer than for practically any other commodity they purchase.

A statement made public here by the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee quotes A. L. Nye, of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, to the effect that American farmers now save \$200,000,000 a year due to reductions in cost of fertilizer resulting from scientific research.

Mr. Nye is quoted as follows: "Chemical research made possible the development of an American potash industry. It was likewise directly responsible for the discovery of methods of fixation of atmospheric nitrogen and for their development into commercial processes that produce materials suitable as fertilizers."

"Chemical research also resulted in various improvements in processes connected with the production of superphosphate. These results of research, as well as many others, have increased the supply of fertilizer materials and lowered the cost of producing them."

"The large decline in fertilizer prices is probably due in large measure to such discoveries as these, because no other logical explanation could be found to account for them."

FLYING FISH
Ever hear about the flying game? Garden who plants fish from like air? His theory is that if moose can be served quick lunches from planes, why not shower down fish for fishermen? And it works! The plane carries water-filled tank in the cockpit. In the tank are the small fish. 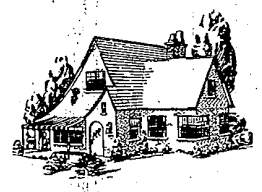
