Increase in Claims For Job Insurance

The beginning of seasonal shut-downs in automobile plants for model change-over purposes was an important factor in lifting the number of new initial claims for job insurance filed against Michigan last week to 4,581, an increase of 140 per cent over the preceding week. It was revealed this week by V. B. Steinhilber, Unemployment Compensation Commission Director.

Numerous requests from workers for pre-determination of their benefit rights for the new benefit year beginning July 1 also aided in boosting the previous week's total of 1,995.

Increases were reported by four of the Commission's five administrative areas but the most impressive rise occurred in Metropolitan Detroit; initial claims accepted in this area constituted nearly 80 per cent of the State total.

Among out-State offices to report increases over the preceding week were Jackson, Bay City, Ann Arbor, Holland, and Flint.

Although the State total of jobs

filled in private industry by the Michigan State Employment Service during the week was only three per cent above the total for the week before, significant increases were reported by a number of offices.

For the State as a whole, private placements for the week numbered 3,558—just 97 ahead of the previous week. However, increased activity in the canning industry resulted in greatly improved private placements reports from the Jackson and Owosso offices. Other localities from which healthy increases were reported included Manistique, Escanaba, Muskegon, and Holland.

Principal causes of placements with firms connected with lake shipping, Fort Huron placements rose by 41 to 118.
