consulting OPACS. Secretary Wickard was asked not to grant a requested milk producers' price increase in the Washington, D. C. market.

OPACS placed ceiling prices on pig iron, a major raw material in the production of steel announced that a schedule will be imposed on upper-grade lumber on the west coast, took steps to prevent an increase in the prices of carbon black, and asked the railroad wheel builders to withdraw price advances scheduled to take effect July 1.

Trucking Committees Formed  
 With a growing problem, Transportation Commissioner Ralph Budd formed 16 regional committees to advise him on motor truck hauling.

Mayor F. H. L'Guardia asked the State governors to set up organizations for the handling of the aluminum scrap collection campaign and urged households to donate all aluminum kitchenware which they no longer find useful.

A program for providing defense housing projects with necessary materials was promptly was worked out by Priorities Director Edward H. Stettinius, Jr., and Defense Planning Coordinator C. F. Palmer as President Roosevelt approved new facilities for liberalized FHA financing and temporary shelters for 10 defense communities.

## Fort Custer Trainees Return From Maneuvers

A full program of unit and selective training, motor maintenance, cleaning and repair of weapons and equipment and a series of regimental reviews has been outlined for the 5th Division's first full week at Fort Custer after returning from the Second Army maneuvers in Tennessee.

These activities were ordered by Brigadier General Cortlandt Parker, the acting division commander, following the 4th of July weekend, when the officers and men of the Division enjoyed a three-day holiday.

Regimental reviews, which are to be held at a time and place to be designated by the regimental commanders, are to be discontinued. The first review will be that of the 10th Infantry on Monday, July 7. Attached to this review will be the Division Headquarters and Military Police Company, the 5th Signal Company, and the 5th Reconnaissance Company.

On Tuesday, the 2nd Infantry, with the 7th Engineer Battalion attached, will hold a review, while the 11th Infantry, with the 5th Medical Battalion attached, will be reviewed Thursday. The 5th Division Artillery, plus the 5th Quartermaster Battalion and Company C of the 56th Quartermaster Regiment, will be reviewed on Friday.

Unit training ordered for the week will include close-order drill, calisthenics, and the repetition of such other features of training as may be considered necessary by regimental and separate unit commanders. Regimental and separate unit commanders will confer Monday on further training measures based on their experiences of the maneuvers.

Military posts throughout the country have the Fort Custer escort Reception Center to thank for their present complements of men. Men for the activation of the 23rd Division at Camp Livingston, Louisiana, came in a large part from Fort Custer. Cornelia posts - Fort Ord, Camp Callan, and Camp Haan, have received a great number of Michigan men through the Fort Custer center. To the Cavalry at Fort Riley, Kansas, the Quartermaster Corps at Camp Lee, Virginia, and the Infantry Training Center at Camp Wolters, Texas, to name only a few, have come many hundreds of Fort Custer selectees.

Fort Custer's 5th Division, recently returned from maneuvers in Tennessee, received many hundreds of the reinforcements which brought it to full strength from the local reception center.

Celebrities of all kinds have passed through the "mill." The men from all walks of life constitute an almost perfect cross-section of Americans.

The 20,600 selectees who remember the Custer reception center are in many parts of America. "They were a healthy bunch," as one member of the personnel put it. "All of them had about the same ideas," he said, "They're better than good sports. Most of them took the Army seriously from the first."
