

OCC, Faculty In 2-Year Pact

Classes were back to normal Wednesday on the Orchard Ridge campus of Oakland Community College after faculty and administrators reached agreement on a two-year contract.

After two strikes and uncounted hours around the bargaining table, the college reached agreement on a pact that provides a considerably smaller salary increase than was originally demanded.

The final agreement calls for a wage boost of \$300 for faculty members this year and another \$100 increase during the second year with

provisions for a \$100 inflation adjuster. The increase will take effect after the wage-price freeze is lifted.

The 300 MEMBER OCC Faculty Association originally agreed to their negotiating team's offer for a \$400 increase with a \$30 cost of living increase each month of a one-year contract.

"We are satisfied, but we are not overly excited about having a contract for two years on the terms we got for the second year," Chief Faculty Negotiator Rod Chase said after the agreement was reached late Tuesday.

Faculty members had begun to strike Monday for the second time this fall. The first strike began two days after classes began on Sept. 8 and continued for a week before an injunction was imposed.

The injunction expired Sept. 30 and round-the-clock bargaining started. The second faculty strike began Monday after an agreement was not reached.

A STATE mediator, Leo Cadwell, had attended

parliamentary sessions and came up with the proposal that was approved Tuesday.

The administration was back in court Tuesday trying to get a second injunction against the strike when Cadwell made his proposal and recommended that both sides adopt it.

Chase said that although an injunction was not granted, the threat was "hanging over our heads" when the faculty went to consider the proposal and then ratified it.

The administrators agreed to the proposal, and the board of trustees agreed to ratify the contract "at their next public meeting," Chase said.

When the faculty members met on Sunday they voted to affiliate with the Michigan Education Association. Since the OCCFA organized as a non-affiliated union at least six years ago, the faculty had discussed, but never agreed, to affiliating with the MEA, Chase said.

Linking up with the MEA, Chase said, "will just provide more power and more resources available to us in the future."



Astronomer Lovell To Speak At SC

One of the world's most distinguished scientists, Sir Bernard Lovell, will speak on "The Individual and the Universe" at 8 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 12, in the upper level of Waterman Center at Schoolcraft College.

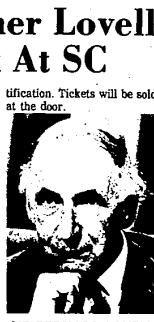
Lovell is director of Britain's Jodrell Bank Observatory where a giant, steerable radio-telescope tracks radio waves from the remote parts of the universe.

Known throughout the world for its tracking of Soviet spacecraft, the telescope has played an historic part in the space age and in the development of astronomy.

Lovell is a fellow of the Royal Society and a recipient of the society's royal medal. In 1961 he was knighted by Queen Elizabeth II.

He is a professor of radio astronomy in Jodrell Bank, a department of the University of Manchester, and has received several honorary degrees from British and Canadian universities.

Sponsor is the Cultural and Public Affairs Committee's Lecture Series. Admission is \$2 for the general public, 50 cents for Schoolcraft students and staff, and \$1 for other students with valid identification.

Recall Charges Untrue--Collins

Trustee Douglas J. Collins, target of a recall movement among Oakland Community College students, denied charges he had hampered negotiations with striking faculty members.

Dave Carlton, a student, announced a meeting for "students and members of the community" to organize "for the purpose of recalling members of the board."

That meeting was to have taken place Friday afternoon in the J-building of the OCC Orchard Ridge campus in Farmington.

Carlton gave his phone number as the office of the Recorder, the Orchard Ridge campus newspaper.

On source among the students indicated that Dr. Collins and George Mosher were the targets; another named Dr. Collins and Eugene Johnson.

Dr. Collins called it "completely untrue" we attempted to block negotiations; but declined to give details of a closed meeting where a board majority gave informal approval to a new contract.

We have examined the combining balance sheet of the various Funds of the Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties at June 30, 1971, and the related combining statement of revenues, expenditures and fund balance for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances except as noted in the following paragraph.

The amount of taxes receivable was not confirmed with the taxing units. However, we did satisfy ourselves by the application of other auditing procedures as to their fairness of presentation.

Our audit was on the financial records of the District and not on the child accounting records.

In our opinion, the accompanying combining balance sheet of the various Funds and the related combining statement of revenues, expenditures and fund balance present fairly the financial position of the various Funds of the Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties at June 30, 1971, and the results of their operation for the year then ended, in conformity with accounting procedures recommended for educational institutions by the State of Michigan, Department of Education, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.
