& Company, Detroit branches, has the job.

The new addition is being erected at the east side of the old building, and will be joined to it to present an unbroken line fronting on Grand River.

The new building will provide storage space for 50,000 cases of wine aging in the glass after bottling. It will also house new storage cellars with a capacity of 50,000 gallons of finished wine ready for bottling. Oak casks will be installed for this purpose. Part of the new area will be used as a rectifying room for wine cocktails, an exclusive LaSalle product.

A covered loading dock will facilitate deliveries. The new building is planned for occupancy in time to handle the 1941 grape crop.

Financially LaSalle's position is a cause for civic pride too. The winery's annual report for the fiscal year ending May 31, 1941, showed operating results for the past year were the highest in the history of the company. This is the third successive year in which there has been an improvement in earnings.

The net profit for the past year, after deducting all charges, is \$120,375.20 which is equal to 60c a share on the outstanding stock. These earnings are in comparison with \$85,865.55 or 41c a share for the preceding year.

BRAKES VS. HORN

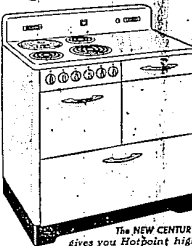
If all cars stopped IN TIME, there would be no accidents. It is highly important that you learn not to "outdrive" your eyes. You must be able to stop in the assured clear distance ahead. If you can see ahead only 20 feet—and no more—you must be able to stop in that 20 feet. Stopping is important, but what is even more important is being READY to stop. Know what your brakes can do. They vary. Whenever you get into a strange car, test the brakes first. Some drivers, instead of preparing to stop in time, just blow the horn and hope for good luck. 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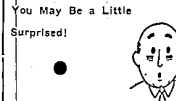
