"Through examination and frequent checkups of all contacts, many new cases are found. Every effort is directed toward persuading contacts to be treated at the sanatorium.

"Tuberculosis cases are visited by a public health nurse as soon as possible after discovery and the desirability of sanatorium care is emphasized. The law may be used to enforce hospitalization of tuberculous patients known to be infectious but it is rarely necessary to go further than to make the patient aware of this fact. As a last resort, a few non-cooperative individuals have been taken into court.

"Patients are visited periodically after release from the sanatorium by a public health nurse. Advice and assistance in carrying out the recommendations of the sanatorium is given by the nurse, sputum specimens are collected and re-examinations by x-ray are arranged for.

"Ninety new cases of tuberculosis were discovered during the year, 86 of which were adult pulmonary tuberculosis and four, other forms of tuberculosis. Of the new cases of pulmonary tuberculosis reported, 13 (14.8%) were minimal, 44 (51.7%) were moderately advanced and 23 (23.5%) advanced. The low percentage of minimal cases found indicates a need for more nurses. The difference in the cost of caring for a tuberculosis case found in the minimal stage instead of in the advanced stages would more than pay the salaries of additional nurses.

"There were 37 deaths from tuberculosis, giving a death rate of 19.7. This is one of the lowest death rates in the state and about one half that of the state as a whole.

"At the end of 1940, there were 393 known cases of tuberculosis in Oakland County, 451 contacts were tuberculin tested through the efforts of the County Health Department and the nurse provided by the Tuberculosis Association, 285 of those skin tested were positive. All those whose tuberculin tests were positive were x-rayed. A total of 1,473 x-ray examinations were made, 123 patients with pulmonary tuberculosis were admitted to the sanatorium.
