Miss Betty Kernzer has been staying a part of the past two weeks with her aunt, Mrs. Perry Taylor in Northville.

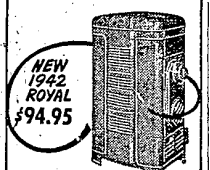
Mrs. L. E. Coates spent Monday with Mrs. Perry Taylor who still is quite poorly as the result of an auto accident.
