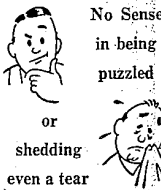

ANNUAL BAZAAR AT EVANGELICAL CHURCH TUESDAY

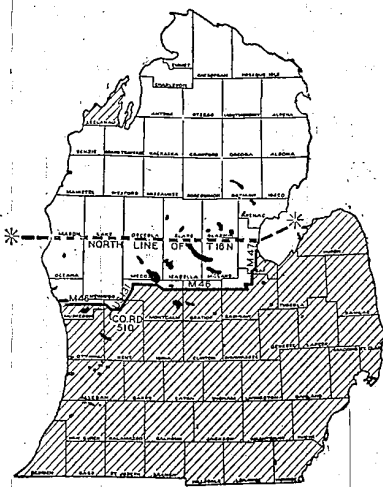

Rules Change at the Dotted Line



Posters along the highways will warn traveling hunters when they are crossing the north line of Township 10 North, the boundary between hunting and trapping Zone 2 on the north side of the line and a 55 license, but below the line the 210 license is required. Rabbit and muskrat hunting ends January 31 in Zone 2, December 31 in Zone 3. Muskrat and mink may be taken from November 15 to December 15 in the northern zone. December 1 to 31 in the southern region. Prairie chickens and sharp-tailed grouse may be hunted only as far south as the north line of Township 12 North, which is four townships south of the line dividing the zones. Shaded areas are closed to deer hunting. Zone 2, not shown, is all of the upper peninsula.
