### Rules Posted For Sending Gift Parcels to Britain

Rules for the sending of gift packages through the mail to Great Britain were posted this week by Postmaster Norman Lee. Such parcels whether or not they contain rationed foods sent from one individual in this country to another individual in the United Kingdom may not exceed the weight limit of five pounds.

Also they may not contain more than two pounds of any one foodstuff. The five pound weight limit is also applicable in the case of non-foodstuffs. No license or permit is required for such parcels although they must be clearly endorsed to show that they are gifts.

of schools. This list has since grown to over 500 children from families employed on Defense work.

The grant from the Federal Works Agency is based on the number of newcomers who have moved in because of Defense work of the last two years and not the natural growth of the school area which has been taken care of at Walled Lake Schools. The securing of this grant necessitated many days of conferences with officials in Lansing and Detroit and check-ups in the local community and answering of questions with Government officials. With the present system of State Aid to Schools local taxpayers are not faced with maintenance of a large school as the money is spread state wide according to the enrollment of each particular school.
