## Dollars Saved Through Christmas Seal Pennies

Through wise sowing of Christmas seal pennies, Michigan is saving millions of dollars in tax money, according to Mary Malar, seal sales manager for the Michigan Tuberculosis Association. The Christmas seal finances an intensive campaign to prevent tuberculosis. In 24 years it has lowered Michigan's tuberculosis death rate 66 per cent. Yet care for victims of the disease costs taxpayers of this state \$1,000,000 each year.

"Certainly, pennies for prevention are wisely invested," Miss Malar said.

If the seal sale which is now in progress and closes Christmas day, brings in the amount anticipated, the Michigan Tuberculosis Association will conduct the most intensive educational drive in its history during 1942, she stated.

Although not much can be determined this early as to the result of the Christmas seal campaign, Miss Malar considers the number of early returns very encouraging. The letters of appreciation come back with the money for the seals, telling of a neighbor or relative who has been helped by the Christmas seal work.

"There are several contributors whom we consider as old friends although we have never met them personally," Miss Malar said. "Our always mails us a check for seals before the campaign opens—an other returns a dollar for each seal sent him."
