NYA EMPLOYS 162 YOUTH IN OAKLAND COUNTY

A total of \$,374 youth, of whom 4,228 were boys and 4,046 were girls, were employed on National Youth Administration projects in Michigan as of November 5, a report made public today by Orin W. Kaye, state NYA administrator, *Tevenled.

Of this total number, 152 were engaged on projects in Oakland county which is in NYA area number three. In that area there were 1,415 youth employed on projects. The number on projects in Oakland county lacklided 46 boys and 116 girls.
