The Annual Report for 1941, of the Register of Deeds Office, wis released this week by Orrin McQuatd, Register. During 1941, the Register of Deeds has topped all previous years in the number of recordings and total income.

Total business for 1941 was 371, 47136, as compared to \$35,569,42 in 1940, \$41,394.75 in 1939 and \$31,-21.54 in 1938, 1941 shows an increase of 23 percent over 1940, and 37 percent over 1930, Mork was divided as follows:
28,315 Deeds recorded, for a total fee of \$31,695.75; 5,678 Mortgages recorded, at \$113,240,95; 5,134 mis-cellaneous recordings at \$5,559.81; occludated and \$13,384.45; 401 Title Searches recorded at \$23,410; 38,949 Chattel Mortgages filled at \$9,237.25; 13,273 Chattel Mortgages discharged at a fee of \$1,53,190 and 645 miscellaneous filed records at a fee of \$1,53,190 and 645 miscellaneous filed records at a fee of \$1,54,15.
