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Offer Bond Purchase Plan

Employees of Consumers Power Company soon will be able to purchase United States Defense Savings Bonds through voluntary pay roll allotment. D. E. Karn, vice president and general manager of Consumers, announced today. Mr. Karn said the plan will become effective as soon as the clerical details can be worked out and a supply of printed forms obtained. He predicted that it will be in operation early in January. "This plan is being inaugurated as a service to our employees and to the Government," Mr. Karn said. "A great many of our employees already have bought Defense Bonds and others have expressed a wish to do so. The Company is

attempting to make the purchase of bonds as easy and convenient as possible, believing that if an employee buys a Defense Bond he not only renders his Country a patriotic service but also makes a sound and wise investment for himself.

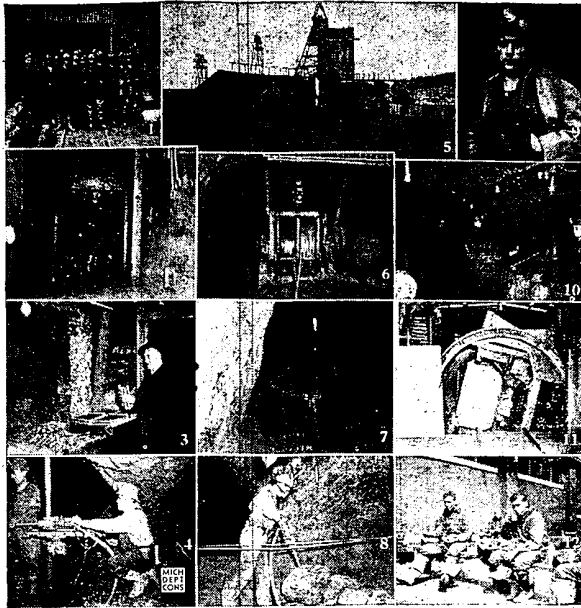
"Through the pay roll allotment plan, purchase of Defense Bonds will become automatic. Participation will be entirely voluntary. An employee who wishes to buy a bond will simply authorize the Company to deduct, an appropriate amount from his pay check every month until the bond has been paid for. It thereupon will be registered in his name or in such manner as he desires, and delivered to him by the Government."
