RONALD COLMAN FEATURED AT CIVIC THEATRE

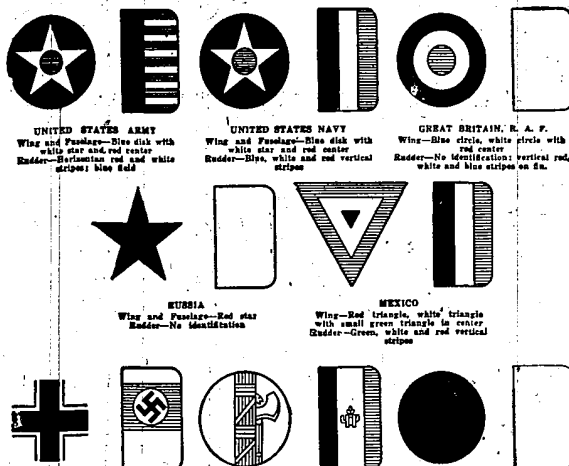


Ronald Colman in "My Life With Caroline," with Anna Lee and Charles Wintinger heads the double bill on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday at the Civic Theatre. Colman is seen as the husband of Caroline. Caroline is an easily influenced woman, always imagining herself in love with some man other than her husband. However, loving her too much to let her go, by subtlety, Colman, pictured as a wealthy publisher, solves his domestic problems. He never misses an opportunity to declare his love, and he puts Caroline in such a position that she realizes her shortcomings, and the film closes with a rather unexpected ending.

Completing the double bill is "Aloma of the South Seas" with Dorothy Lamour and Jon Hall. This is a dramatic story, filmed in technicolor, which takes place on a Tahitian island in the South Seas. It concerns the selection of a girl as the future wife of Tanoo, son of the chief and high priest. From here the story follows the children as they grow up and are involved in jealousies or other lovers. However, a volcano erupts, as the result of the killing of the high priest when a rival suitor of the girl tries to kill the young couple as they are being married. The great explosion or Krakatoa takes place, with earthquakes, rumblings and fire. The juicy story ends in a stream of lava, and Aloma and Tanoo are left to complete their wedding and rule the island.

How to Distinguish Nationality of Aircraft



Civilian air raid spotters will have no difficulty distinguishing Axis planes from those of the United Nations if they memorize the markings illustrated above. American and British planes have designs of red, white and blue, and Russia has a red star. Watchers on the southern border occasionally may see the red triangle of Mexico. Axis raiders are easily spotted through the familiar black cross and swastika of Germany, the round red rising sun emblem of Japan and the Roman fasces insignia borne by Italian planes.

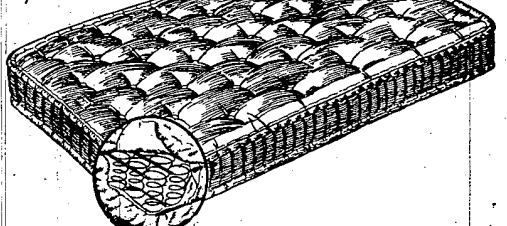
