Minutes of regular meeting held December 10th, 1941 read by the City Clerk and approved.

Motion made by Griffith and supported by Hamlin with regard to the additional items of expense in connection with remodeling of the town hall that Howard Otis be empowered to ascertain the exact costs of further items to complete the job and be authorized to act thereon.

Roll Call:—Hamlin, Nacker, Otis, and Griffith—Carried. All yeas.

Motion made by Hulett and supported by Otis that the City combine with the Township in the filing of an application on the sewer project with the understanding that there will be no expense in connection with the filing of this application; however, in the event that money will have to be expended the Commission will be advised of the amount and its obligations.

Carried—All yeas.

Motion made by Griffith and supported by Hulett that the City Commission accept the resignation of Chief Kowalski as of February 1st, 1942, and authorize Police Commissioner Hulett to employ a man to take his place as of February 1st, 1942, also, to receive applications for an additional man and that the fact be publicized in the newspaper.

Amendment to Preceding Motion:—

Motion made by Otis and supported by Hamlin that applicants and hiring of the new Chief of Police be passed on at a special meeting of the City Commission. Also, that Chief Kowalski be voted an expression of thanks for his work and co-operation in setting up our present system.—Carried—All yeas.

Motion made by Hulett and supported by Nacker that Judge Schulte's fees as shown on all back Justice Court reports be paid.

Roll Call:—Hamlin, Nacker, Otis, Hulett and Griffith—Carried—All yeas.

Motion made by Nacker and supported by Hamlin that the meeting be adjourned. Carried: All yeas.

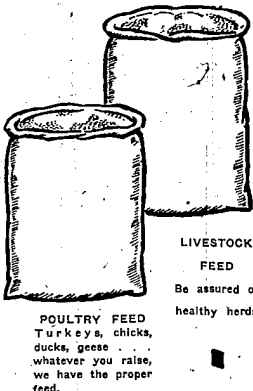

Methodist Ministers Back Retirement Fund

The Methodist Church of the Detroit Conference, numbering several hundred churches, has launched a campaign to raise \$300,000 within two years for its ministers' old age retirement fund. This amount will raise the pension for retired ministers from 16 to 22 dollars per year of active service.

The Methodist ministers of the conference give a percentage of their salaries toward the pension fund. Now the laity of the church, by action of the last annual session of the conference, have taken the responsibility of this campaign to increase the fund. Every church in the conference is cooperating in meeting its share. Payments may be made in five parts over a two year period.

Dear Sir,

Here is a suggestion that may help to reduce the large number of traffic violations we have been having lately.

The drivers who tear into town like greased lightning usually do not know about our low speed limit until they approach the business section where it is obvious that one must proceed slowly. We residents know the rules here, but outsiders seldom look for speed limit signs outside of the city. We hid them, anyway.

I believe that if this speed limit between the Farmington Lumber Company and Lakeview avenue, for instance, were raised to 45 miles per hour, and the same thing done in other similar places, the number of traffic violations would be considerably reduced. Most drivers already travel at or above that speed, along there, and it really does no harm as there are few buildings and the pavement is

wide. I do not intend to advocate an unsafe speed, by any means, but I have seen higher speed limits in much busier places than that.

People just won't slow down on an open highway, so, as long as it's safe why not give them a break? Otherwise make signs big enough to be seen.

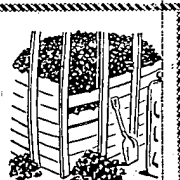
ERSKINE EVANS II RECENTLY MARRIED TO HILLSDALE GIRL
