Corn Champs Give Success Recipe



CHICAGO.—"You've got to feed the soil if you expect the soil to feed you!"
That's what Ed Doubet and Floyd Hiner will tell you. And they'll prove to you that soil improvement not only helped them produce bumper crops but put them in the front rank of farm folks in the United States.
For Doubet and Hiner are the Corn Kings of North America. They won that honor jointly at the recent International Grain and Hay Show in Chicago—the first time the championship had ever been split. Their 10-ear exhibits of hybrid corn were so nearly perfect, the judges broke the deadlock only by awarding a co-roy.
Doubet, who farms 340 acres near Hanna City, Ill., keeps up his soil's productivity by being eternally vigilant about its fertility level. He puts back into the land plant food elements removed by crops. He limes regularly and uses a generous application of 0-20-20 fertilizer every year. He follows a regular rotation

YOUR FAMILY WILL ENJOY THESE APPLE DISHES

Mmmm . . . yum! If you've never had baked Michigan apples and sausage on a cold winter morning or wintry night, you've missed something. The fragrance alone is enough to give your men folk extra big appetites . . . so make enough for several helpings. All you do is this:
Select and core medium sized tart apples. In the center, place small link sausage or spiced sausage meat. Bake at 375 degrees for 30 to 45 minutes.
In the center of a large dish, place a mound of steamed hominy. Around this arrange the baked apples. Serve with hot biscuits.

AND DID YOU KNOW THAT . . .
For a buffet meal an unusual combination is sliced apples mixed with cheese or sandwich spread. A tasty, healthful, attractive looking dish. Slice medium size apples but do not peel. Then dip in lemon juice and dry on a paper towel before spreading.

Another buffet dish is a tray of cheese slices alternated with apple slices. Very colorful . . . and good!

Apples are dietetically correct with meat dishes; aid the stomach and digestive tract in assimilation of meats, especially pork and tenderloin. A good rule is to serve apples with meat dishes.

For salads, candies and where the raw flesh of the apples is to be exposed to air, dip in lemon juice or salt water immediately after cutting the apple. A comparatively small amount of lemon juice is a sauce equally serves.

An ancient cure for warts was to cut an apple in two, rub it in the warts, tie it together again and bury it!
In biblical times the apple was given to the sick to smell!

DURHAM, N. H.—A treatment for deafness, using the spine as a spigot to withdraw excess pressure from the ears, was reported to the American Association for the Advancement of Science here.

A small quantity of spinal fluid is withdrawn by tapping the spine near its base. The result has been marked improvement in hearing in more than 40 per cent of cases.

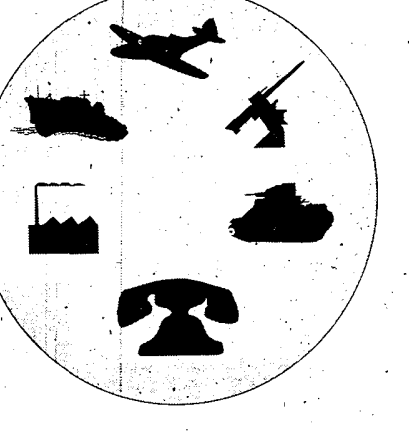

SO WAR NEEDS MAY BE MET

In 1941, about \$300,000,000 was spent by defense industries in Michigan for new plants, new machinery and equipment, in preparation for war-materials production. That is a big sum of money.
