## Old Eyeglass Frames May-Bring New 'Specks' To Needy Persons

Frames from a pair of old glasses may be all you need to get those new "specks" your eyes have been pining for. That is, all you need if the family paycheck won't stretch far enough to buy glasses.

DeRoy Jewelry Company of Redford has begun again a service started last year. It provides eye examinations and glasses for the worthy of the Redford-Farmington area whose purses just won't stretch far enough for optometrist's fee plus those complicated lenses. The service is carried on in cooperation with churches, charitable organizations and local clubs.

The plan is based on the belief that most families have old glasses' frames in their attics or trunks that are apparently worthless. However, if they are brought into DeRoy's, Dr. Hoberman, optometrist in charge of his modern scientific optical studio, will clean them up and make them ready for use.

By bringing them in, patients can be saved the cost of new frames. Patients wishing to take advantage of the plan must also

bring with them a letter from their church or other charitable organization. Cost of lens will be shared by DeRoy's and the patient or the organization sending the patient. Last year a large number of persons are reported to have taken advantage of the plan and thus received the benefits of scientific eye examinations.

"I am glad to contribute my time to such a worthy enterprise," Dr. Hoberman said and added, "I only hope the response is as strong this year as it was last year."

## "Money Talks"

Not satisfied with the common knowledge that "money talks" in the Orient, as well as in the West, Japanese officials of the Osaka mint have been giving various national coins an acoustic test. It is the Japanese idea to determine which is the best coins from the sounds they make when dropped three inches on to a wooden board. The standard sound is graded at 10. The best money tested was announced to be a 20-yen Japanese piece minted in 1898 which was rated at 17, or seven better than standard.
