A Russian-born minister, once a member of the Communist party and later imprisoned because he became a Christian, will be the speaker at the Sub-District Missionary Institute for the Methodist Churches of Oakland and Livingston counties at the South Lyon Methodist Church Sunday, March 8, at 7:30 p. m.

The Rev. Janis Laupmanis who was converted to Christianity from his Communist beliefs was confined for some time in a Russian prison because of his Christian beliefs. He escaped to England where he spent four years. He has been in the United States for approximately a year and is now on a lecture tour through the Midwest.
