A preliminary game in which Farmington Merchants will play a Wayne Recreation League team will be held at 7:30.

The Globe Trotters are now in their 12th season on the road, and have played to over 1,250,000 fans. They are rated tops in negro sports and are particularly well known for their sensational dribbling, fancy plays, clever ball handling, rapid fire passing, trick shots and backhand passing.

Farmington boys who will play in the all-star team against the Globe Trotters are Howard Kraft, Ed Maas, Elmer Catherman, Don Oldenburg and Bob Chapman. Seven or eight men from other teams in the Wayne Recreation League will also be on the all-star team. The portion of the money from the game which goes to the Farmington Merchants will be used to sponsor basketball next year.
