The West Farmington Extension Group will meet at the home of Mrs. Jessie Power, 31004 Fourteen Mile Road, Thursday, for an all day meeting.

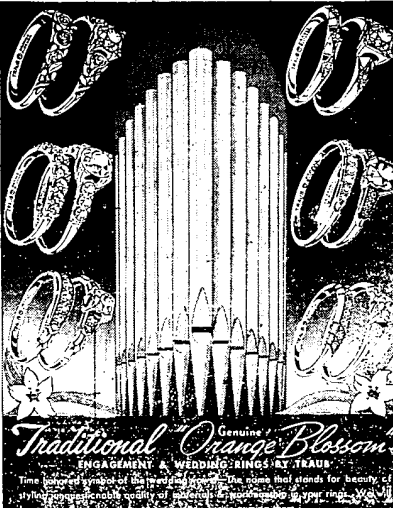
Roland Green returned home last week from a six weeks visit in California.
