DOROTHY'S DIARY

MONDAY: Had intended to uncover bulbs in garden but am pre-occupied by new broom. Work instead on new red and white checked curtains for kitchen.

TUESDAY: With picking shears, cut strips yard long, inch and a half wide from same material as curtains, gather on sewing machine, and use to edge kitchen shelves. Very gay effect.

WEDNESDAY: Continue improvement in kitchen's appearance by hanging red and white pocket bag (like those for shoes) on back of door. Put in each pocket the things that usually clutter up a kitchen—whisk broom, dusters, string, rubber gloves, etc.

THURSDAY: George unexpectedly helps kitchen campaign by showing me picture in magazine solving problem of small bottles and boxes that always seem to be behind everything else on the shelf whenever you want them. I follow the suggestion by nailing pie tin through center to kitchen shelf, and placing on it the elusive containers. By revolving the pie tin, I can now get at them easily. Enamelled tin bright red before nailing to match kitchen trimmings.

FRIDAY: Now so pleased with kitchen that I spend considerable time in it preparing elaborate meal for George. He had unfortunately eaten a chocolate bar before dinner, but I myself enjoyed the meal, particularly the main dish.

Served Whitefish with Spiced Tomato Sauce

2 twob. whitefish
1 chopped onion
1 chopped green pepper
1 No. 2 1/2 can tomatoes
1 tsp. ground cloves
1 tsp. chopped parsley
1 clove garlic
4 tbsp butter or salad oil
salt
Pepper

Clean whitefish and remove scales. Rub salt and pepper on inside of the fish. The fish with string to keep them from falling apart while baking. Brown pepper, garlic, and onions in butter or oil. When brown add cloves, parsley, and tomatoes and bring to a boil. Place fish in greased baking dish and pour sauce over them. Salt and pepper to taste. Bake about 35 minutes in moderate oven. (375 degrees). Bake done. Place on platter, remove string, pour sauce over and serve.

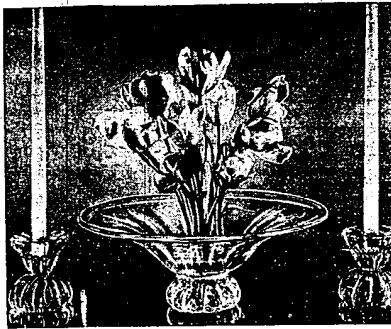
Painted Pots Detrimental

Vinyon Stockings May Be
Answer to Hose Problem

A chemical fiber which may someday become a rival of nylon is the material vinyon, a thermoplastic chemical substance which can be spun into long, fine fibers. Vinyon shoes are on the market. They are the kind with transparent water-clear heels or toes.

Vinyon stockings were woven experimentally two years ago but unexpectedly "bugs" have held up their commercial sale while nylon stole the show. Maybe the current shortage of silk and nylon will spur further work on vinyon stockings.

The shortage certainly has spurred nylon production for new plants are in the making and it should be only a year at the most before nylon holds a much higher place in the nation's stocking output. Last year some 43,000,000 pairs of hose were sold in the United States and 92 per cent of this vast total were all silk, or silk leg with rayon or cotton tops.

Nylon sold 2,750,000 pairs which constitute a little over 6 per cent of the total. Doing a little subtracting you can see how small was the sale of rayon, cotton and wool hosiery to women in 1940. Just about 2 per cent.

Saratoga Trunk, by Edna Ferber. One of the year's top best sellers. "Saratoga Trunk" is a colorful, fast-moving, romantic novel, with two of the most glamorous leading characters of recent years—beautiful, witty, Dilo Dulano of New Orleans, looking for a rich husband; handsome Clint Maroon of Texas, gambler, cowboy, and murderer. By a little discreet blackmail in New Orleans, they get enough money to visit fashionable Saratoga in search of gullible millionaires, and throw the resort into an uproar with their unconventional ways. Edna Ferber has filled the book with rich detail, sketching in brilliant colors the America of the 1850's.

The Wabash, by William E. Wilson. Eighth in the Rivers of America series, this story of the Wabash, from the prehistoric days of the Hoosier State history. It touches the lives of nearly all Indiana's well-known figures, some of them famous the world wide—Abraham Lincoln, Theodore Dreiser, James Whitcomb Riley. Of the early settlements on the Wabash, some were founded on strange creeds—George Rapp's Harmonies, deserted because it was "too prosperous," and recaptured by Robert Owen's communistic colony. These soon disappeared, but many towns prospered, and grew into cities, such as Vincennes, Terre Haute, Lafayette. The book is beautifully written to convey the river atmosphere and the illustrations add to its charm.

Labels, by A. Hamilton Gibbs. A story of the last war's effect on the members of a well-to-do English family—Sir Thomas Wickes, who saw it as means to gain personal fame and fortune; Dick, his valiant son; Tom, disgraced as a conscientious objector; Madge, who went to France and fell in love with an American soldier. The book opens immediately after the Armistice, and describes how Sir Thomas's obstinate views drove his children from home, each to work out his own destiny and find happiness.

Richard Halliburton: His Story of His Life and Adventures. A revealing autobiography as told in letters to Halliburton's father and mother, beginning in his early youth and ending with cables from the "Sea Dragon," the boat on which the author disappeared over three years ago. Many of the letters are from "Tide-knave" places, sought out by the adventurous Halliburton for this very reason—Timbuctoo, Borneo, Ethiopia, untravelled sections of India and China. During his lifetime he visited nearly every country in the world, and described them vividly in these informal letters, written without thought of publication. The book is illustrated with a number of interesting photographs.
