COMMANDOS STRIKE AGAIN

AT SEA—Another small Allied vessel was sent to the bottom of the Atlantic by an enemy submarine recently. List of Scrap To Be Secured

An effort to secure a complete list of abandoned and otherwise discarded scrap of all kinds in the Oakland County was launched today by the Oakland County Defense Council's Salvage Committee, of which O. L. Beaudette is chairman.

The program will be conducted in cooperation with the State, which last Saturday announced that it planned, through the W.P.A., to solicit all farms in the State to add to the tremendous amount of scrap materials vitally needed in the defense program.

Along with the farm program, the State is urgently requesting that the location of all abandoned scrap piles be reported to the Oakland County Defense Council Salvage Committee, old Masonic Temple building, Pontiac, which will act as clearing house for this information. Those who know of such scrap piles are urged to write to the Defense Council, or phone Pontiac 4-2142.

It is estimated by State officials that enough abandoned scrap is lying in small piles in out of the way places throughout the State to construct over 100 tanks for the nation's armed forces.

"We are interested in locating who the organizations are and the amount they are collecting and selling," Beaudette said. "It is believed there are a number of such groups not known to the County Salvage Committee which are doing important work, and they are asked to report their activities to the Defense Council office so that a complete record may be kept."
