NEW PROGRAM PLANNED FOR CITIZENSHIP DAY

Due to the present emergency, it is impossible to continue Oakland County Citizenship Day as in the past. However, the President is still asking that this day be celebrated. Accordingly a program has been worked out with county leaders that emphasizes Americanism, that should stimulate public morale, and that at the same time will carry on the tradition of an annual Citizenship Program.

Instead of having a ceremony inducing new citizens, the program this year will commemorate citizenship itself. The idea is to publicize the lives of a patriotic citizen and actually do now.

One part of the program will consist of three high school students who through elimination contests will have won \$25.00 defense bonds by speaking on American citizenship. Another part of the program will consist of a "token" citizenship induction of a soldier, sailor and a marine. There will also be a presentation of the colors, marching music, and a speaker.

The program will be Sunday, May 17, at 2:00 p. m. in the Pontiac High School Gymnasium. The Oakland Citizens League is sponsoring the program again, and James F. Moore, Executive Secretary of the League, is acting as Chairman.
