**MICHIGAN MAN NAMED CHRISTIAN SCIENCE EDITOR**

Announcement has just been made by The Christian Science Publishing Society in Boston that Peter V. Ross, C.S.B., will succeed George Shaw Cook, C.S.B., as editor of the Christian Science periodical. These comprise The Christian Science Journal, the Christian Science Sentinel, and The Herald of Christian Science.

Mr. Ross was born near Howell, Michigan, and received his education in the public schools, Michigan State College at East Lansing, and the University of Nebraska, being admitted to the bar in 1899.

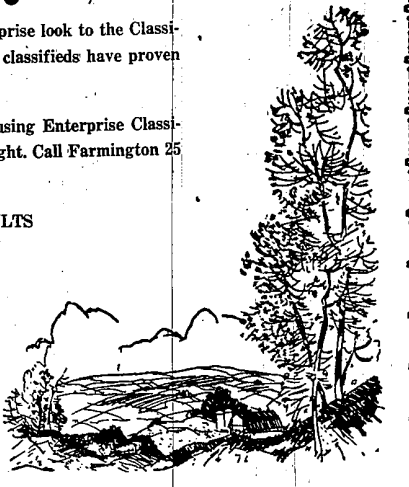
