VICTORY GARDENS

Michigan Council of Defense

1. Join your local Victory Garden Club.
2. Plan your garden in advance so as to get the most out of your ground.
3. Select a plot apart from your regular flower beds, a site that will receive six hours of full sun every day, and has good drainage and water supply.
4. Order your seeds early, enough for your needs, without waste. Order extras seed for succession crops and to produce late vegetables for storing and canning.
5. If your soil is stiff, heavy clay, don't plant root crops, but confine your efforts to vegetables whose fruits or leaves are eaten.
6. If you are inexperienced, don't try difficult crops.
7. Encourage your neighbor to plant a Victory Garden, too. A score back loves company.

SPRAY NOTES

Third in a series of articles prepared by Jack Willhoeb on fruit spraying is printed herewith. Apple Scab sprays will become active to 12 hours after the first rain. It will be necessary to have a Pink application of wettable sulphur or liquid lime and sulphur on

just before the blossoms open. Due to the lack of moisture to swell the spores, we may look for a large infection during the blossom season. The growers who apply a spray of Flotation Dry Wettable Sulphur in full bloom will benefit very greatly. The Jonathap leaf is not so readily affected by scab, therefore it is advisable not to use Lime and Sulphur on them after the Pink application. Also Flotation Sulphur does not tend to break down arsenate of lead in the spray tank. Milder materials lessen the arsenical injury and russetting of the fruit will result if this is used before the First Cover Spray.

Danger Signals Shown by Legumes When Starvation Menaces Their Life

LEGUMES that are starving for plant foods reveal their distress by losing their healthy green color and developing white spots around the edges of the leaves that spread over the entire surface. But unlike starvation in human beings, this ailment is much more frequently fatal, for the leaves turn yellow and die.

The three essential plant foods most needed by legumes, as by other crops, are nitrogen, phosphorus and potash.

In general, slow growth, smaller plants and reduced yields are the result of nitrogen deficiency. Phosphorus deficiency causes slow growth, small and under-developed plants.

Of all starvation symptoms noticeable in legumes, those of potassium hunger are the most easily recognized. Irregular white dots or mottled patches appear around the leaf edges. These finally merge, forming

a continuous yellowish rim around the leaf. Among things to watch in particular species of legumes are the following, according to the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee: Soybeans. A pale green to yellowish-green color indicates a lack of nitrogen. When potash is urgently needed, forming a yellowish band along the sides and tip of the leaf. Red Clover. Potash hunger starts with a series of yellowish or white dots around the tip and sides of the leaf. The entire margin of the leaf becomes yellowish and then dies as the condition spreads to the center.

Alfalfa. When symptoms appear the plants are in desperate straits for nourishment. In general these follow the trend in other legumes. The discoloration starts as small dots; then it involves the entire leaf margin and is followed by death of the tissue.
