The CHAMBER serves as a center for other community activities such as distribution of the Jaycee Community Directory; receive calls for the Goodfellows; distributes maps, industrial listings,

general information on the community; and has much involvement with local officials of the city, township and school district as well as our representatives at the state and federal level.  
As the chamber looks to 1972 it plans a concerted membership drive. The chamber believes that every business must take an active role in local, state and national issues if it is to survive and be strong in the days ahead.  
At the annual meeting of the chamber to be held Jan. 25, the "citizen of the year award" for 1971 will be made and Attorney General Frank Kelley will speak.  
In addition to the con-

tinuation of the projects carried on in 1971, the chamber will take an active role in the development of a full-time employment service for the young people, ages 14-21, in Farmington. Blighters Sentenced

FARMINGTON  
Farmington Township inspectors are enforcing the township's anti-blight ordinance, and so far, three violators have been sentenced in court.  
Those ticketed by zoning enforcement officers Hal Rowe and Mike Hawley and sentenced by Farmington District Judge Michael J. Hand include:  
Paul Agar of 29214 Independence, who had a number of junk cars at his home. He was fined \$100 plus

\$4 court costs and placed on one year's probation.  
Tom Kaljevic, of 29554 Medbury who was fined \$100 plus \$4 costs and placed on one year probation for having junk cars on his property.  
Howard Eldridge, of 20925 Oxford, who was fined \$100 plus \$4 cost for anti-blight violations and given a 30-day sentence which was suspended providing Eldridge removed the violations.  
Judge Hand warned that any repeat violations by those sentenced would result in fines of \$100 per day and probably jail sentences.

Cage stood mute when arraigned Dec. 21 before Farmington District Judge Michael J. Hand and bond was set at \$1,000. Included in charges is possession of a stolen car, a 1971 Mercury, valued at \$3,550.
