SPRAY NOTES

Rains have released scab spores in apple and pear orchards. If foliage has not been covered within seven days prior to petal fall, it is important to put a blossom spray on of 5 lbs per 10 gals. of Flotation Dry Vegetable Oil or 10 to 12 lbs. of Flotation Paste to protect against this period of scab infection.

After petals have fallen it is advisable to use 1½ gals. of lime and sulphur, 3 lbs. arsenate of lead, and 2 lbs. of spray lime per 100 gals. of spray mixture. Exceptions to this are on blocks of Steele Reds and Jonathans, where it would be advisable to use the blossom spray recommendations of sulphur in place of lime and sulphur. This is to guard against rusting the fruit. The same exception may be exercised on other varieties when the grower is sure that he has had perfect coverage both before and after the rains.

Petal fall sprays on sour cherries should be applied at once. One of the low soluble copper compounds should be used at the manufacturer's recommendations for control of cherry leaf spot, plus 2 lbs. of arsenate of lead for curculio.

Best results have been obtained with a combination of copper and wettable sulphur for control of leaf spot and brown rot on sweet cherries. Use 2 lbs. of lead arsenate, 3 lbs. of spray lime, 3 lbs. of flotation dry vegetable oil, 1½ lbs. of 2½% low soluble copper compound per 100 gallons of water.

LEGION BLOOD BANK NAMED OFFICIAL AGENCY

Designating the American Legion Blood Bank as the official agency for dispensing blood and plasma to hospitals and casualty stations, the Detroit Office of Civilian Defense moved to protect over two million people in this area. The population of Wayne, Macomb and Oakland Counties will be served by the American Legion in event of air raids and sabotage.

The appointment of the American Legion Blood Bank is a mark of distinction for an outstanding service established over a year ago. The Detroit District Association of the American Legion, representing seventy-two Posts and approximately ten thousand Legionnaires, organized the Blood Bank for the purpose of serving veterans, their families, indigents and emergency cases. These cases will continue to be served through the American Legion by those who are contributing their blood at the Henry Ford Hospital where facilities are provided by Mrs. Henry Ford as a contribution to Community Welfare.

"In view of the time being done by the American Legion Blood Bank in this area, it is our desire that the American Legion be given full authority and responsibility in this matter for defense purposes." The American Red Cross Blood Inactive Service, which is procuring blood for the Army and Navy, is to cooperate with the American Legion so that every demand for blood and plasma may be met during any emergency in this area. This statement was made by Dr. Grover Penberthy, Medical Director of the Detroit Office of Civilian Defense, through Dr. Warren B. Cooksey, Co-chairman with Dr. F. W. Hartman of blood and plasma supply.

Wherever this need may occur, blood and plasma will be supplied at once to hospitals and emergency centers. In readiness are two established facilities with their trained personnel ready to instantly deal with the problems of drawing and supplying these life-giving fluids for transfusion purposes. Several of the Detroit Hospitals have Blood Banks which will be supplied with additional reserves from the American Legion Blood Bank which will be augmented by the American Red Cross facilities in drawing for critical needs. Blood and plasma and necessary transfusion equipment will be supplied to these hospitals and casualty stations not having Blood Bank, by the American Legion. This service will be established on a twenty-four hour basis. The collection of blood is a simple procedure that entails no element of danger from the stand-

point of the donor. Hundreds have visited the Henry Ford Hospital and the American Red Cross Donor Stations and have given their blood. A donor may give a pint at a time and because of the fact that in the average individual the blood volume is inclined to be greater than the requirements of the body, the removal of this small quantity has no deleterious effect upon the circulatory system.

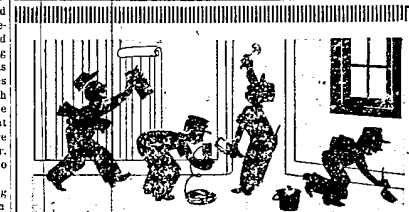
