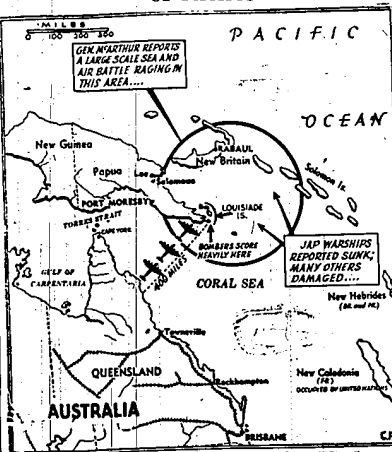

OF PACIFIC



This map shows the approximate location of the battle which has
been raging between United States and Japanese naval and air forces
in waters north of Australia. The most recent announcement last
Monday from allied headquarters stated 21 vessels including two sub-
marines, a seaplane tender and a tanker, had been sunk or damaged
during the activities of the past seven days. The final result of the
battle may not be known for days.

"My purpose is to put the win-
ing of this war in first place. Our

a lawyer and I will not be re-
quired to give any of my time to a
law practice if elected to the
United States senate.

"I fully realize the handicaps
I will have in this campaign. I do
not have access to the free use of
the United States mails.
Neither can I demand the services
of state-owned automobiles, tires
and gas in order to assist my cam-
paign. I know something about
how active and how energetic are
the thousands and thousands of
federal and state payroll partak-
ers during campaign time.

"But I have defeated political
machines before and I am confi-
dent that I can do it again. If no-
minated and elected I pledge to the
people of Michigan services in the
people of Michigan senate that I know
they will wholeheartedly approve."

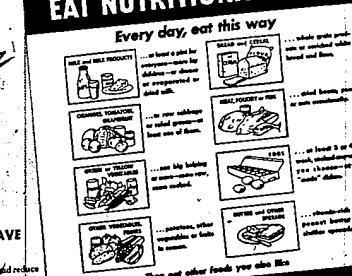

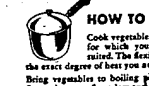

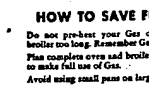
HOW TO SAVE
