Holland To Be Memorial Day Speaker

American Legion Plans Special Parade

Judge H. Russel Holland will be guest speaker at the Memorial Day services in Farmington next Saturday. Judge Holland spoke at the services last year, and is brought back again this year by popular request. Judge Holland brought out last year in stressing the fact that this holiday is a day of memorial service, not a day of celebration. This is even more true this year, than it was last year.

Those taking part in the parade will assemble at the Legion Home on Grand River avenue, at 9:30 Memorial Day morning, and will parade to the Cemetery, where the services will be held. About 25 members of Groves-Walker Park, Redford, Post 358, of Redford, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Sea Scouts and Cubs will all take part. The Farmington High School band will lead the parade.

An invitation to march with the local Post has been accepted by Ann Arbor, from June 18 to June 25. These girls will be recommended by the High School faculty, and will be sent to Girls' State, under the sponsorship of the American Legion Auxiliary. Bernice Lundberg has been chosen alternate.

Irene Morris has been chosen to represent Farmington at Wolverine Girls' State, held on the University of Michigan campus at Ann Arbor, from June 18 to June 25. Irene was selected from a group of five girls recommended by the High School faculty, and will be sent to Girls' State, under the sponsorship of the American Legion Auxiliary. Bernice Lundberg has been chosen alternate.

The 1942 Girls' State annual program is dedicated to the training and development of girls who possess inherent qualities of leadership. One of the primary objectives of Girls' State is to stimulate girls to take a deep interest in the development of home and community life.

The girls will be able to enjoy many of the privileges and facilities of our great state university. Regular members of the university's large, and well-trained staff will offer guidance, instruction, and demonstrations in household arts, physical education, dietetics, art, physical education, dietetics and allied subjects. The vast recreational and athletic resources of the University will be placed at the girls' disposal, so that the serious phases of the program can be interspersed with games and sports.

PROCLAMATION

Whereas, the wearing of the memorial poppy is a fitting and effective way of keeping bright the memory of those young men who gave their lives in America's service in the World War, and of the young men who have given their lives in the present struggle to maintain freedom, and

Whereas, the men of Farmington served gallantly in these wars, some being called upon to sacrifice their lives in service, and Whereas, the present national situation requires the same type of unselfish patriotism displayed by the men and symbolized by their memorial flower, and

Some nineteen hundred years ago the Apostle Paul said, "I can do all things through Christ Jesus that strengthen me." Class of 1942 To Hear Fisher

Charles A. Fisher, Director of the University of Michigan Extension Service, will give the commencement address to the Farmington High School graduating class, Thursday, June 4 at the high school auditorium.

Born in Huntington, Indiana, Fisher received his A.B. degree from DePaul University. He then attended Columbia University in New York, where he secured his M. A. degree. Fisher then received a Ph. D. degree from the University of Michigan.

He was principal of the Benton Harbor school from 1914 to 1919. From 1919 to 1926 he was principal of Kalamazoo Central high school. Fisher became Assistant Director of the Extension Division in 1926 and Director in 1937.

Fisher is at present Second Vice-President of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, and a member of the National Education Association. Baccalaureate service will be held in the Farmington High School auditorium Sunday, May 31. Rev. Gilbert Miles, former pastor of the Farmington Baptist Church will conduct the service.

Identification To Be Secured For Auxiliary Police

Farmington residents will experience their first total blackout this Sunday evening, May 24, from 10:00 until 10:15. This is the only one and the first for this area, but the first total blackout, since the first practice was carried out with the street lights on. This time there will be no lighting of any kind, and if there should be a light on it would shine out like a beacon, so be sure that all your lights are out.

Another difference between Sunday's blackout and the one previously held is the fact that the approaching test will be held under the provisions of the new City ordinance which governs blackout regulations, and also provides for a fine and imprisonment for willful violation.

Air raid wardens, auxiliary police and firemen and all local defense officials will be at their posts to observe the blackout, and to see that the proper procedure is followed. It is important that these trial blackouts be carried out in the best manner possible so that

On Page 4, of this week's Enterprise is printed the full text of Farmington's new blackout ordinance. It is important that you study this ordinance carefully and save it for future reference.

There will be no confusion and resulting catastrophe if the occasion comes when an air raid alarm must be given.

Defense plants, at army request, will not be required to observe the blackout. Throughout Detroit and the entire metropolitan area, all defense work will go on as usual.

To Have Identification The Civilian Defense Council completed arrangements for the blackout at their meeting on Tuesday night. Also decided at the Council meeting was the necessity of having identification for the auxiliary policemen. Chief of Police Joseph DeWendt has been appointed to investigate the cost of such identification as white hats, gloves and belts in which reflectors have been set. Many times these auxiliary policemen must walk traffic, and they may be placed in danger of being hit by an approaching automobile if they are not easily identified and readily seen.

The air raid wardens will soon conduct a survey, and questionnaire blanks will be ordered which each resident will be asked to fill out.

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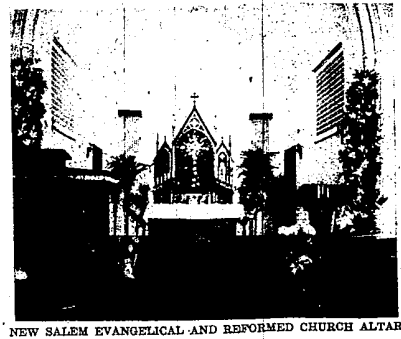
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Obituary
