Farmington High School's baseball team invited the Brightmoor All-Stars over for a practice game and after they got here didn't treat them very much like guests. Coach Bob Hutton used 18 players in substituting the All-Stars for a score of 8 to 5.

In the first inning the Stars put together a single and a double for one run. In the home half of the first Holmes doubled, went to third on an error, and crossed the plate on a pass ball by the catcher to tie the score. There was no more scoring until the home half of the fourth inning, when Ryan tripled and came home on Russell's single. Farmington counted again in the sixth, when Beck walked, took second on an error and scored on Russell's second hit of the afternoon.

The Brightmoor Stars put together a single and two Farmington misplays in the eighth inning for another run. In the home half of the eighth, F.H.S. scored five more runs on four hits, a walk, and two Brightmoor errors. In the first half of the ninth Brightmoor combined two hits, three walks and five pass balls for three more counts.

Coach Bob Hutton used five pitchers in the game, starting with MacCulloch, then Marindale, Barber, Kish and last Maloney. Pauline, Ryan and Russell led the Farmington hitters with two each, Ryan taking honors with a triple and a double.

The game with Northville scheduled for Friday, May 15, was called off because of rain.

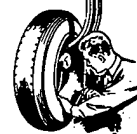
Boys' Discussion Group Plan Outdoor Party
