work out the world's destiny (it would appear that we are working out her fate). When we come to the place in this scheme where we do not know how to continue we go to work and start all over again in our complacent appointment of more chairmen and more committees.

Need it be said that it is time for a conscientious return to the faith of the great Apostle Paul, "I can do all things through Christ Jesus that strengtheneth me." Oh, but we are quick to reply: "We seek the Divine blessing upon what we do," yes, "God Bless America" (I do not want to be understood as being unpatriotic). Such we do indeed. But it is time we reverse the order of those words as has Grant Colfax Tullar: "Bless God, America." In this sense of Christian Patriotism Dr. Tullar goes on to express the fact that for years and years God has been blessing, how if we (America) wish this blessing to continue it will be required of us that we bless God.

This Sunday we come to the Festival of Whitsunday (Pentecost) on which we remember the sending of the Holy Spirit. Before the Master ascended up, He instructed His Disciples, who were a bewildered group, to go to Jerusalem and wait there until the Holy Spirit was sent upon them, at which time they would be endowed with great power from on high. Every Christian Church, in a sense, continues that direction and instruction unto man. The disciples obeyed the instruction, "And when the day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place," and for their obedience they were rewarded from above. Sadly it must be said that thousands today have not obeyed the continued instruction coming from the Church, which is Christ's body upon earth. I am convinced that this is our only way out. "Be still and know that I am God." In fact we must wait until the Holy Spirit is come upon us, for other ways we will have to stop our own babbling long enough so that God can speak to us. In the day that we listen to God and give Him an opportunity to direct our lives we shall recognize the depth and adequacy of Paul's faith, "I can do all things through Christ Jesus that strengtheneth me." The Church lends itself to our quietness and in the Church the act which is most conducive to our communion with God is the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. "This do in remembrance of Me." We say that God is the Author and Father of our faith, might it not then be well if we were to give Him a hand in it?
