Bills Will Be Rendered Every Month

Conservation of materials and manpower make it necessary to change certain operating methods, including meter reading. Beginning in June, meters will be read every two months, instead

This applies to residential meters and certain commercial meters. It does not apply generally to industrial customers.

The plan will be started on June 1, 1942, and the new scheduling of meter reading provides for one-half of the meters to be read in June, and the balance in July, and thereafter bimonthly.

Bill Each Month

- If your meter is read in June, you bill will cover one month's metere consumption as heretofore.
- If your meter is not read during the month of June, your bill will, unde-ordinary conditions, be one-half the bill computed for the previous two

month. (This will all be shown on your bill.) Thus the bill will be automatically adjusted every other month.
