Raw Material, by Dorothy Canfield. While not exactly fiction, this book holds the materials from which fiction is made. In it Dorothy Canfield presents 21 sketches of people she has known whom she considers too interesting to be dismissed as characters in a novel. Some are members of her own family, like Great-Uncle Giles, who had a genius for living on other people's money. Others are friends living in the author's native Vermont—among them Old Man Warner, who stayed on his lonely hill farm despite the townspeople's efforts to dislodge him. Still others are French people met during long sojourns in France; the sketch of Octavie Moreau and her imprisonment being particularly timely now, though it happened during the last war.

Guide to Successful Gardening, by M. G. Kain. A book to study and enjoy now, with your garden actually in bloom, for it will answer all the questions you have been asking yourself—about seeds that haven't come up, what flowers are best suited to a border, proper lawn care, and the many other subjects even the best of gardeners are in doubt about at times. The material in the book can best be judged by a few of the chapter titles: Annual Flowers, Rock Garden Secrets, Lawn Making and Management, Vines for Home Adornment, Shrub Pruning, Home Fruits for High Quality, Vegetable Garden Planning, Bug and Blight Control, Rynagene, Manures & Fertilizers, Coldframes and Hotbeds, Planning Woe Gardens.

Tuesday Never Comes, by Lida Larimore. Lovely Julia Perry, heroine of this romantic love story, was the belle of the town, and engaged to the son of its richest citizen—handsome, spoiled, Jay Sumnerfield. But Scott Mitchell comes between them, and tragic results from the broken love affair are only narrowly averted by Julia's sister Caroline, her devoted suitor, Dusty Price, and Julia herself. Caroline's secret love for Jay, and her resentment of Julia's treatment of him, also play an important part in the story.

Burma Road, by Nicol Smith. Day by day account of a trip over the famous Burma Road, before this lifeline of beleaguered China was cut by the Japanese. Some of the most interesting parts of the book are those in which Nicol Smith writes the stories told him by different people he meets on the road—Chinese coolies, Frenchmen, wealthy merchants, princesses and peasants, travellers of all nationalities and types. These tales give a clearer picture of life in the region covered by the Burma Road than the actual travel story itself. There are many photographs by the author.

BE SEASONED?

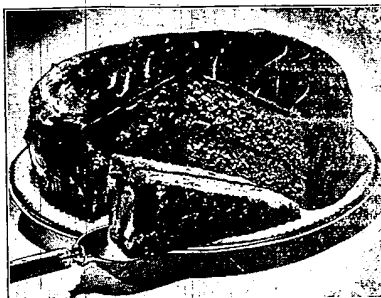
Each side should be seasoned after it is browned—when the chops or steaks are turned and when they are done.

Fluffy Chocolate Cake

2 cups sifted flour
2 cups baking powder
1/2 cup salt
1 cup light corn syrup

5 eggs, honey
2 eggs
1/2 cup vanilla
1/2 cup pine seed
1/2 cup sweet chocolate, melted
1/2 cup milk

Mix and sift together flour, baking powder, and salt. Cream—shortening thoroughly. Drizzle in corn syrup and honey. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add vanilla and chocolate.

Add flour mixture alternately with milk, beating well. Bake in two 5" greased wax paper-lined pans.

BAKE AT: 350° F. TIME: 40 minutes.

Velvety Chocolate Frosting
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup package semi-sweet chocolate, melted

Cream butter and add unbeaten eggs, one at a time, while beating. Melt chocolate, cool slightly and add slowly. Continue beating until thick and smooth in consistency.

Spread on cake. YIELD: Enough frosting for tops and sides of two 5" layers.
