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## Chairman Makes Final Plea For China Relief

Charles B. Crouse, chairman of the Detroit Committee for United China Relief, Inc., spoke over Radio Stations WXYZ and WWJ Saturday, June 20, in his final appeal to Detroiters to help China and meet the \$250,000 quota Detroit was assigned in the national drive for \$7,000,000 to maintain eight American relief organizations which are maintained in China under the auspices of United China Relief. Detroit so far has earned about \$130,000.

Crouse pointed out that help for millions of Chinese orphans and refugees at this time will go far toward keeping firm the morale of China's armies which must hold on to the vital air bases in China from which American airpower can ultimately bomb Tokyo and all of Japan. Not until late this year or sometime in 1943 will American war production and military strategy permit the diversion of sufficient planes and weapons from the European struggle to carry out the annihilation of the Japanese. But China is entering the seventh summer of its war against Japan and the suffering of her population can only be alleviated by American help.

Many Detroit fraternal, religious and civic groups have been contributing to China on a monthly or quarterly basis this year and are urged to keep up this plan, mailing their checks to the Detroit Trust Company, transfer agent for the National headquarters of United China Relief. The Detroit Committee closes its office June 30.

## DONDERO NAMED TO SPECIAL JOINT COMMITTEE

Congressman George A. Dondero has been appointed as one of the eight members of a special joint committee of the Senate and the House to consider a bill to place the Bonneville and Grand Coulee power projects in Washington and Oregon, under one administrative head and grant broad powers to the administrator. The committee's membership is as follows:

Rep. Homer D. Angell of Oregon; Rep. J. Hardin Peterson of Florida; Rep. Martin F. Smith of Washington; Rep. George A. Dondero of Michigan; Senator Charles L. McNary of Oregon; Senator John H. Overton of Louisiana; Senator Harold H. Burton of Ohio; Senator Homer T. Bone of Washington.

The measure, introduced by Senator Bone and Rep. Smith, would create a Columbia River Authority for acquiring the private utilities in the States of Washington and Oregon by purchase, lease, condemnation or donation. The Government could operate them or turn them over to municipalities or other bodies for public operation.


