The repair and posting of warning signs on McGee Hill is to be done at once; as the road has been shut off to traffic until reinforced guards around the curve can be installed, and proper warning given.

Carl Hogle brought two matters to the attention of the Commission, one concerning complaints made against a dog kennel which is located on Thomas Street, directly behind the City Hall. The other complaint concerns the vacant house at the corner of Oakland Avenue and Ross Street. Since a fire occurred at the house several months ago, the building has become increasingly worse and is now useless as it is. The sidewalks are in bad condition, and the place really should be condemned to fairness to other taxpayers, and the entire City.

Zoning Dispute
Commissioner Hulett, referring to a letter received from Mr. Keelin, a Pontiac architect employed as counsel by Ernest Light, moved that the City refer the Light matter to their attorney, John J. Schulte, Jr., and that he take such action as he deemed necessary to settle this zoning question. The motion was passed with one dissenting vote, that of Commissioner Hingle. Mr. Light has remodeled his home to include two apartments in the upstairs, and also a basement apartment, which is in violation of the provisions of the City Zoning Ordinance. He was served a warning and given sixty days to correct this condition, but the only reply received was the letter from his attorney.

Mayor Hamlin read several communications, including one which designated Farmington as Tin Collecting Headquarters, in a nationwide drive for salvage tin. This tin would be collected through a local committee, and sold for \$15.00 a ton to a Pittsburgh company. A resolution was adopted, upon motion of Commissioner Hulett, asking G. Donald Kennedy, State Highway Commissioner, for a determination of the speed on U.S. 16 through the City of Farmington. 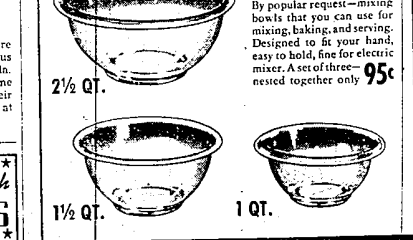
