FORT WAYNE

More than 2,500 Michigan men and women are now employed at Detroit's historic old Fort Wayne which now serves the Armies of the United Nations as the central Quartermaster Motor Supply Depot. These war workers are recruited from all parts of Michigan by civilian service personnel chiefs on the basis of their skill and background, and the roll call at this busy Quartermaster Depot shows scores of Michigan home towns from Stambough to Monroe. The growth of civilian personnel from four workers in September 1940 to 2,500 employees today is the expansion of motor transport activities at century-old Fort Wayne. According to Col. Hare there are now 716 women employees working as stenographers, mimeograph operators, typists, bookkeepers and other office jobs and 1,904 men employed as truck drivers, inspectors, messengers, packers, ship-ment men and scores of other occupations. Fort Wayne civilian employees are on civil service pay-rolls and work 48 hours each week. For many months most Depot activities have been on a seven-day, 24-hour basis and millions of dollars worth of Michigan-made goods and supplies have been flowing day and night to fighting fronts throughout the world. At the opening of the fiscal year on July 1, 1941 there were 744 employees at Fort Wayne. The increase of personnel during the past twelve months was accelerated during the last sixty days when numerous Motor Transport units of the Quartermaster Corps were transferred from Washington and Baltimore to Fort Wayne. Besides utilizing old barracks for office space, the Quartermaster Corps has leased commercial warehouses and storage areas throughout the metropolitan area and has taken over four floors of the Buil-

RED CROSS NOTES

As part of a general program to build Red Cross services in Oakland County to a wartime peak, an intensive course in first aid teaching techniques opened this week for dentists. The course was organized at the request of the medical division of the civilian defense board and the Midwestern Area office of the American Red Cross has sent Joseph F. Creed as special instructor. At completion of the two weeks course, the dentists will be assigned to teaching Red Cross first aid to civilian defense groups. Dr. C. C. Goodes of Farmington is among the dentists taking the course. Mrs. Ferd Brock has been appointed vice-chairman of volunteer special services of the Oakland County chapter of the American Red Cross. It was announced by Mrs. Sheldene Noble, chairman. Four hundred and sixty five Oakland County residents are enrolled

Building in the heart of metropolitan Detroit. The strength of the military personnel at Fort Wayne is a military secret but nearly 100 offices are now engaged supervising buying, shipping, inspection and other activities at the Quartermaster Motor Supply Depot, Col. Hare said.

LICENSE PLATES NOW ON SALE AT HALF PRICE

Automobile owners who have not previously placed 1942 license plates on their cars and trucks may do so now at half price and these plates will give them the right of the use of the roads until March 1, 1943. Plates may be purchased in Farmington from the branch of the Secretary of State's office in the Blackstone Chevrolet Sales and Service. Harry F. Kelly, Secretary of State, called attention to the fact that this plan follows the plans of previous years and particularly fits the needs of the motorist at this time, due to the fact that many commercial and private vehicles are now required because of seasonal demands of farmers and cherry growers, and demands made through war work. Mr. Kelly also stated that motorists who have full year 1942 plates on their cars may now convert them into half year plates by going to the branch office and purchasing a metal strip 10 inches by 1 1/2 inches that will change the half year plate into a full year plate without requiring, as in the past, the hauling of new license numbers. This strip bears a serial number that will make it possible for the Secretary of State's office to determine the actual ownership of each strip in case of loss or theft. It is suggested that motorists by their cooperation in making it possible to conserve the use of steel and the cost of manufacturing the plates and asking their further cooperation by seeing to it that these strips are firmly attached to their half year plates.

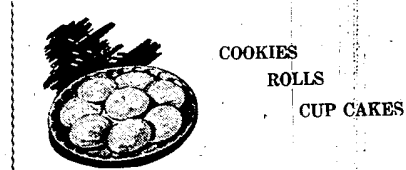

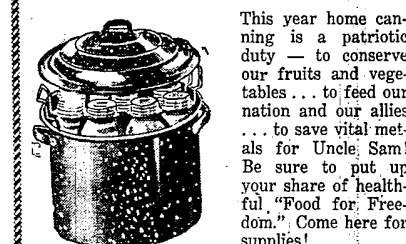
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
