Regular meeting of the City Commission of the City of Farmington was held on July 15th, 1942.

Meeting called to order by Mayor Hamlin at 8:45 p.m. Commissioners present: Nacker, Bagnall, Hulett, Griffith and Hinger.

Minutes of the regular meeting held June 10th read by the City Clerk and approved.

Motion made by Bagnall and supported by Hinger that the Commission accept the resignation of Howard Otis and that the Clerk be instructed to notify him to that effect, and also that we wish to extend our appreciation to him for his work on the City Commission. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Bagnall and supported by Hulett that the current tax bills due July 1st to the City of Farmington be received up to September 1st without penalty. A two per cent penalty will be charged beginning September 1st and a four per cent penalty will be charged beginning November 1st. After March 1st all delinquent taxes will be returned to the Oakland County Treasurer and an additional four-per-cent charge will be made by the County. It is also moved that the City Treasurer be authorized to send a notice to all tax payers who are delinquent on August 15th, 1942. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Hulett and supported by Griffith that the matter of C. E. Light's violation of the zoning code be referred to Judge Schulte who will take such action as he deems advisable. Yeas, Nacker, Bagnall, Hulett, Griffith—Hinger. No—Carried.

Motion made by Nacker and supported by Hinger that Harrison Johnson be appointed Commissioner to fill vacancy of Howard Otis; Roll Call: Nacker, Bagnall, Hulett, Hinger, Griffith. Carried, All yeas.

Motion made by Hulett and supported by Nacker that the following Resolution of G. Donald Kennedy asking for speed determination on U. S. 16 through the City of Farmington be passed.

- 1. Agree to change City ordinance to conform with speed determination set up by the State Highway Department.
2. Agree to enforce the speed limit set up.
3. Agree to pay part costs of signs and erections of same.
4. Stop signs for intersection on U. S. 16. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Bagnall and supported by Hinger that meeting be adjourned. Carried, all yeas.
