Truck Fire Damages Nursery

Funeral Services Held For Tracy

One of the worst accidents that Farmington has seen in some time occurred last Friday afternoon when a tractor with two trailers overturned on an automobile at the corner of Middle Belt and Grand River Avenues.

The truck, loaded with gasoline, jackknifed into the car as both vehicles tried to stop for a second car which had crossed Grand River without stopping for the intersection.

Rodney Huxton, formerly of Farmington and now living in Detroit, driver of the tripped car, leaped from his car and escaped with only minor injuries, but the driver of the truck, Kenneth Ward Tracy of 23171 Monterey, Trenton, burned to death in the fire.

Both of Farmington's fire engines were called to the scene of the accident, and firemen battled for hours to control the blaze, which broke out anew as each section of the gasoline company's pipe burst. Considerable property damage resulted from the fire.

The driver of the car which caused the accident, the late Joseph De Vriendt, pointed out that the only charge that could be made against him if he is found, is failure to stop for a through highway, since he was not involved in the accident.

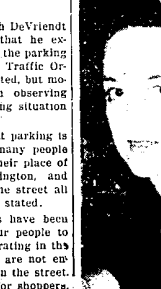
GARDEN CLUB MEMBERS ASKED TO SPECIAL MEET
