He Wanted to Sleep in the Kremlin, Gerhard Schacher.

When Germany invaded Russia, Dr. Gerhard Schacher was a news analyst over station WIND in Chicago. He immediately informed his listeners that Hitler had made a mistake they would always regret.

Dr. Schacher was a renowned journalist-author in Czechoslovakia for 20 years. He came to America a short time after Munich and has successfully maintained his "inside" European contacts.

In "He Wanted to Sleep in the Kremlin" Dr. Schacher explains how the war in Russia threatens the whole Hitler regime. These questions are convincingly answered.

Why has the mortality rate of German generals been so high in the Russian war?

What is the one force within Germany itself most likely to unseat Hitler and his party?

Why did Hess fly to Scotland? The reading of this book will remove your confidence in the outcome of the war.

Navy Diver—Gregor Felsen. Leaving his farm to join the Navy, Jeter Drake little dreamed he would be one of the selected to serve his country on the bottom of the sea.

It is the story of the war at sea, with the scene shifting to the lonely struggle of the diver on the ocean floor.

Mr. Felsen visited the U.S. Navy Deep Sea Diving School at Washington, D.C. to get authentic material. Much of it came from the instructors own personal experiences.

While a fast moving story it gives an accurate picture of the training and work of the Navy Divers. A valuable feature of the book is a supplement containing factual material about the qualifications for entering the diving school and the training course given.

While the Patient Slept—M. G. Eberhart. For other excitement and breathless suspense, the mystery you've been looking for—recommend "While the Patient Slept."

Then he went to China for two years to teach the Chinese to fly.

Cecil Lewis waited twenty years to write a picture of the war in the air, such as no other writer has ever given. A story of reckless courage, romance and futility. A book everyone should read.

THE GARDEN PATH

Peonies are one of the most beautiful flowers and are particularly hard to grow, though some people seem to have trouble getting them to bloom. Dormant plants may be purchased from some dealers in the spring and these will grow and bloom fine. But you are doing your own transplanting or dividing. It is very necessary to wait for their dormant period during late summer or early fall.

Have the new home for these peony roots all ready to receive them, so they will not have a chance to dry out. Work the soil up well and add a little sand to it if the ground is very heavy. Add a little leafmold, manure or plant food, but be careful not to let it come in contact with the roots, as it will burn them out. In the north here plant the roots so that

they will not be cut off and dust the entire area with sulphur.

There are several reasons why peonies will not bloom. One is they are planted too deep and they will just have to reset them in the fall. Upon occasions the ground will contain too much nitrogen and the plant will have nice green heavy foliage, but no flowers.

To remedy this, work potash and phosphorus into the soil in early summer and water as you see several times. More than likely they will bloom the next season.

If you have plants that seem as though they will never bloom in spite of all you have done, you might try this harsh treatment. After the supposed to be blooming, pour out the growth off right down to the ground. Then fertilize well and keep watered. This seems rather drastic, but peonies have been known to bloom every year after this treatment.

Plant your peony bed in a nice sunny spot as they will never grow or bloom well in the shade. Cultivate the ground well to prevent caking and to keep the weeds under control. Weeds take a lot of moisture and food out of the soil and should be going into the plants.

Once you get your peonies established and blooming, they require a small amount of care. Watering in dry seasons, an occasional feeding of plant food and a little hoeing to keep the ground soft and you will have blooms that will gladden your heart.

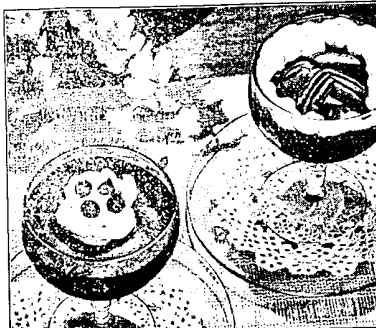
A WORD TO THE WIVES

There will be many more fur coats bought this year than ever before, some of replenish worn out coats and others will go to women and girls who never before have owned one.

A fur coat is a major investment to most people and care should be exercised in selecting one. In the first place, if you have less than \$150 to spend, it would be much better to wait or get a good cloth coat. If you must have one this season. The only durable fur that is reasonable, is Mouton from the Government of that. Other than a few imported furs, there are plenty to go around. So don't be high-pressure into buying by the talk of scarcity.

## Chocolate Mousse A New, Easier Way!



DON'T let hot weather get you down. Here's an easy-to-prepare dessert that will keep the whole family cheerful and cool.

In addition to the benefits to be derived from chocolate itself, there is another plus value in this tasty dessert. The National Nutrition Program recommends the consumption of at least three or four eggs a week per person, cooked in any way or in prepared dishes. Here's a delightful way to comply with this requirement.

**MOUSSE AU CHOCOLAT**  
1 1/2 cup package Semi-Sweet Chocolate, melted  
1 tablespoon water  
3 eggs, separated

Add chocolate to water and melt over hot water. Stir until smooth. Remove from heat and add egg yolks one at a time, beating well after each addition.

Beat egg whites until stiff. Fold gently into chocolate-egg mixture. Spoon delicately into sherbet glasses, and chill until firm. Yield: 6 servings.

Hudson Seal-dyed muskrat—is the best choice if your budget allows \$150 to \$300. The best ones are made only of the backs of the pelts. The weaker parts of the pelt, the head and sides, having been cut off. These coats are superior in both appearance and durability. However the more expensive coats, with the small triangular pieces used, are still sturdy and in one that is well made, the joinings can hardly be detected. That is a must with any price coat you purchase. Examine it carefully to see if the pelt is uniform.

Watch for uniformity in your hand over the back, front and under arm, it should be black and glossy—the fur should look and feel almost alive. A poorly dyed fur sometimes feels even sticky and there is little elasticity.

Fur coat buying is like "buying a pig in a poke" and it is well to deal with a reliable dealer and depend a lot on his judgment. A wise buyer will shop around and good furriers will not mind. You should furnish a much valuable information by doing just that. Beware of ridiculously low priced advertising. It's just impossible to get good furs for a very low price.

Much fur coats, with reasonable care, will last from 5 to 8 years. Choose a coat that is simple in line. That way it can not be dated and will always be in style. Consider the type of fur too. Short or heavy persons should not wear long-haired furs. If you intend to wear it infrequently and are interested in appearance only, the less durable furs are kidskin and Persian lamb. For regular wear though, watch for durability and warmth in the coat you buy. Always buy a size larger than you usually wear, this avoids splitting the seams.

Get the best coat you can, with the money you have to spend, and with a little care, you will have something you can enjoy for years. Bye now.

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## HERE'S A DISH THAT'S FILLING AND ECONOMICAL

In these busy, hectic days it is necessary for all of us to be conservative, not only the material things of our lives, but time as well. Getting things done with a minimum amount of work requires a little cooperation from everyone. I hope this quickie will help you get dinner in jig time on one of your special busy days. Served with a leafy Toss-up Salad and simple dessert, it's all any tired working man or hungry child could ask for.

**Dinner-in-a-Dish**  
1 tsp. shortening  
1 onion—chopped  
1 green pepper—sliced  
1 lb. hamburger  
1 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. pepper  
2 eggs  
2 cups corn  
1 cup dry bread or cracker crumbs

Fry peppers and onions in fat, add meat and seasonings. Remove from fire, cool a little, and add eggs, beat well. Put half of corn in baking dish, cover with meat mixture (half of it) then a layer of tomatoes. Alternate again the layers of corn, meat and tomatoes. Cover with crumbs and dot generously with butter. Bake in a moderate oven for 35 minutes.
