### STAMP EIGHT VALID FOR SUGAR ALLOTMENT

Stamp No. 8 of the War Ration  
Book will be valid for the purchase  
of five pounds of sugar any time in  
the 10-week period between Au-  
gust 23 and October 31, 1942. The  
period is thus terminated at the  
end of a calendar month so that if  
it is found desirable, further ra-  
tion periods may be set to coincide  
with the calendar month.

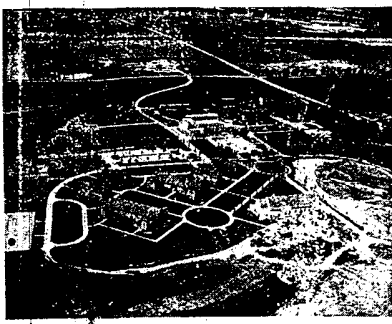
The stamp value will permit the  
disposition of stocks of 5, 10, and  
25-pound packages of sugar now in  
the hands of refiners, wholesalers  
and retailers. It will also alle-  
viate temporarily the burden of re-  
packaging into smaller units now  
assumed by the retailers.

A rationing guide is being issued  
to instruct local boards how to  
issue War Ration Books to con-  
sumers whose excess sugar is used  
up during the period of validity of  
Stamp No. 8.

### MARYGROVE OPENS EARLIEST IN COLLEGE HISTORY

Several new courses designed to  
assist the war effort will be offered  
at Marygrove college with opening  
of the 33rd year of the College  
Wednesday, September 9, earliest  
opening date in the college's history.  
Registration will begin Sep-  
tember 2.

The early opening date is in  
keeping with the College's accel-  
erated program which will permit  
students to take their degrees in  
three years, with first students  
graduating under the new plan re-  
ceiving degrees next January.

New courses include one in Lat-  
in-American history, nursery school  
teaching, offered in connection  
with the newly organized nursery  
school, opening September 23 at  
Marygrove, recreational training in  
physical education, together with  
special emphasis on statistics, eco-  
nomics, laboratory technician train-  
ing, physics, mathematics, and  
secretarial science, to prepare stu-  
dents for civil service positions in  
economics and sociology. Quant-  
ity cookery and interior decorating  
will be emphasized in the curricu-  
lum.

Registration for freshmen and  
sophomores will be September 2  
and 3, for juniors and seniors,  
September 4 and 5, and for resi-  
dence students, September 8. Hours  
will be from 8:30 a.m. to noon,  
and from 1:30 to 5 p.m.

The fall term will open with an  
academic procession September 9  
at 8 a.m., followed by Mass in the  
Sacred Heart chapel of the liberal  
arts building of the campus.

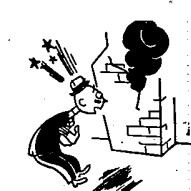
