BOYS TOWN, NEB. THE BUILDING OF A CITY THERE IS NO SUCH THING AS A BAD BOY. With those 9 words as a creed and with the patience and faith that God gives to a man with one great mission on earth, a city has been built on the plains of Nebraska. It is a city with streets paved with hope for hundreds of homeless and abandoned boys who have found sanctuary within its confines. It is the greatest city of its kind on earth and its influence on future generations will be felt forever. In the past it has been the policy of this column to describe a different point of interest each week. Many places have merited more space but time has not permitted. In this one instance we shall deviate from our regular custom. The history and future of Boys Town is so important that 3 entire columns will be devoted to its story. To some of you this story will be your first introduction to Father Flanagan and the work he is doing. To others of you it will be a story worth retelling. The building of character in homeless and abandoned children is news, yesterday, today and tomorrow. This story will, to a large extent, be quoted directly from a history of Boys Town prepared by the Educational Dept. of Father Flanagan's Boys' Home. I sincerely hope its publication in the papers serviced by our syndicate will assist Father Flanagan in his great work. W.B. In the autumn of 1913, when the harvest hands are usually singing in Nebraska as they go about their work of gathering in the grain, a young priest walked about the streets of Omaha, his heart troubled by the idle men who littered around on street corners. For Nebraska and Iowa had suffered a corn failure and these men—who had come seeking work—were finding, instead, unemployment and hunger and want. "Something should be done for these men," Father Flanagan said. The Workmen's Hotel, in Omaha, was Father Edward J. Flanagan's answer to the problem. But after 3 years, Father Flanagan—in summing up the results of his work—felt that he had not been successful. At times he had sheltered 500 men in a single night, but, except for that first year, they had not been working men. They were, for the most part, drunkards and dope fiends, men who, far from seeking work, were seeking to avoid it. But the Workmen's Hotel was far from fruitless. In his study of the thousands of cases which had passed through the Hotel, Father Flanagan had found one common denominator in his search for basic causes—homelessness. Almost, invariably, these shells of human beings who found their way to his door had been left homeless, out of these early searchings grew Father Flanagan's Boys' Home. For Father Flanagan now had a greater vision, a magnificent dream. He could give only temporary relief at the Workmen's Hotel. These men had passed the stage where deep character changes might be effected. But—HE WOULD TAKE THE LITTLE CHILD, HOMELESS AND ABANDONED, AND WOULD WORK NIGHT AND DAY, TO BUILD A GOOD, SOLID, HEALTHY AMERICAN CITIZEN. To be continued.

DO RIGHT BY YOUR refrigerator

...it must "keep things cool" until Victory!

YOUR REFRIGERATOR will last longer if you take reasonable care of it, and that's doubly important today when no more refrigerators are being made. Remember that the one you now have must keep cool for the duration. Treat it accordingly!

- (1) Defrost regularly according to manufacturer's instructions, and empty drip water immediately. Heavy frost on the coils makes your refrigerator work overtime, and increases operating cost. Never use a knife or sharp tool for defrosting.
- (2) After defrosting, wash the entire interior of refrigerator (coils, shelves, trays, etc.). Use lukewarm water and mild soap, followed by fresh water with a little baking soda. This banishes ice-box odor and leaves your refrigerator clean and fresh.
- (3) Wipe up fruit and vegetable juices as soon as they are spilled. (They harm the finish.) Wash the outside surface of your refrigerator with warm water and soap, and dry with a soft cloth.
- (4) Don't overcrowd your refrigerator. Place left-over in small containers to save space. Always let hot foods cool before placing in refrigerator.
- (5) Unless the motor of your refrigerator is hermetically sealed, have it oiled and inspected regularly.
- (6) Be sure there is adequate air circulation all around your refrigerator. Move it an inch or two out from the wall if necessary. The Detroit Edison Company.
