This apparent lack of interest should serve only to further stimulate real Americans in their earnest endeavor to maintain our present liberties.

We can't all be out there on the fighting lines, but we here at home, have just as much of a fight as our boys are finding, whether they be in Australia, in England, or the Far or Middle East. Our fight is to maintain for them, a home and a country as good or better than the one they left. It is up to us to do every-thing in our power, to keep the trust they have placed

It is only by putting competent, efficient men in public office that we can be assured of upholding this trust. Your opportunity comes next Tuesday, when you have the privilege of choosing the candidate you feel most qualified for office.

Share And Share Alike

For so many years, it has been almost unnecessary for us, the citizens of the United States of America, to share many of our worldly possessions, except as we stopped to lend a hand to someone less fortunate. Now, however, with the huge demands of our Army and Navy, and our allies, we are going to find that if it is a case of share and shore allies. that it is a case of share and share alike

Meat will appear less frequently on our tables during the coming year, though the amount we'll get—two and a half pounds per person per week—is about the average consumption for the past ten years. This is well above the one pound a week the Englishman gets, the 12 ounces per week allowed Germans or the five ounces available for half-starved Belgians.

Our total meat supply is the largest on record, the output for the present marketing year adding up to more than 24 billion pounds. But because of the needs of our fighting forces and our allies, this will be three billion pounds short of the estimated needs.

It will take at least four months to set up the machinery for meat rationing. Meantime, Americans are urged to conserve meat.

Likewise, in the hope of conservation, government control of the size and cut of women's clothes will save about 100 million yards of cloth a year but housewives can save still more by choosing practical wartime styles-and by taking care of the clothes

There are too few carpenters, electricians and other skilled workers in the United States, to handle war construction, and to look after civilian needs. Here again we will have to share—be patient with delay you might encounter in trying to secure a skilled tradesman.

The road to Victory is paved with Unity, Sacrifice and Sharing. Be ready to step up like a good soldier when you're called upon to do your part.
