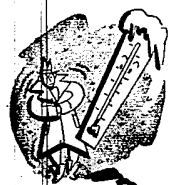

For General Election on Tuesday, November 3, 1942 To the Qualified Electors of the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan:

Notice is hereby given that in conformity with the "Michigan Election Law" I, the undersigned City Clerk, will upon any day except Sunday and a legal holiday, the day of any regular or special election or primary election, receive for registration the name of any legal voter in said City not already registered, who may apply to me personally for such registration.

## BILL WINDRIM ENLISTS IN NAVAL RESERVE

William George Windrim, 18, of 21324 Ten Mile Road, is one of six southern Oakland County men, ranging in age from 17 to 31, who enlisted in the U. S. Naval Reserve last week through the Navy Recruiting Station in the Royal Oak post office.

Bill enlisted as an apprentice seaman and is now in training at Great Lakes, Illinois. He will have an opportunity to select any one of 49 different trades in which to specialize. During his six weeks' basic training, he will have many opportunities to study the various branches of the naval service. He will be given several aptitude tests to determine his manual and mechanical abilities.

Excellent opportunities are available to young able-bodied Americans to help win the war and learn a trade, as well. Navy men receive valuable trade training that provides them with essential skills to hold down better paying jobs in civilian life.

Lewis, in charge of the new trainees recruiting station in the Royal Oak Post Office, reports that 52 southern Oakland County men have passed preliminary physical examinations since Labor Day and that 26 of these are now in training. The others will take their oaths of allegiance upon completion of personal affairs.

## MUCH CLOTHING CONTRIBUTED FOR WAR RELIEF

Mrs. Katherine Beach, Chairman of the Christian Science War Relief Committee of the Christian Science Society of Farmington, reports that a shipment of clothing, bedding and other articles, nearly all of them hand made from new materials, was forwarded recently to the general headquarters in Boston, Mass. whence the articles will be sent overseas for the relief of war sufferers abroad. Two hundred cases were shipped from Boston during the past week.

Besides the need for civilian clothing, knitted garments for the men in the services of the United States are being supplied. The Boston office received a request recently for 4,000 pairs of socks, 1,500 sweaters, 1,500 helmets and as many gloves as could be supplied. One of the most useful articles in knitted wear is a pair of mittens with a trigger finger knitted onto one of them.
